

ORDINANCE NO. 132.

An ordinance to regulate the sale and giving away of spirituous, malt and vinous liquors and other intoxicating compounds, within the City of Forest Grove, Oregon.

THE CITY OF FOREST GROVE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person not a registered pharmacist or a registered assistant under the laws of the State of Oregon, to sell or give away any spirituous, malt or vinous liquors or other intoxicating compounds within the Corporate limits of the City of Forest Grove.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for a registered pharmacist either by himself or by his registered assistant, to sell or give away spirituous, malt or vinous liquors or intoxicating compounds, without first having obtained written permission from the common council of the City of Forest Grove.

Sec. 3. Any registered pharmacist or registered assistant desiring to sell or give away spirituous, malt or vinous liquor or other intoxicating compounds under the provisions of this act, shall submit to the Common Council of the City of Forest Grove, proof of his registration as such pharmacist or assistant, under the laws of the State of Oregon, and shall pay to the City Treasurer of the City of Forest Grove, the sum of \$10.00 which shall entitle him to a permit covering a period of one year, and for a shorter period he shall pay a proportionate amount; but no permit shall be granted for a shorter period than six months; he shall also execute a good and sufficient bond to the City of Forest Grove, to be signed with two or more good and sufficient sureties, satisfactory to the said Common Council of the City of Forest Grove. Said bond shall provide that the applicant shall not sell or give away spirituous, malt or vinous liquors, or other intoxicating compounds, within the City of Forest Grove, except upon a written prescription by a registered and practicing physician, and that he will not make more than one sale or gift upon the same prescription, and that he will keep a record in which shall be entered the names of all persons to whom he sells or gives spirituous, malt or vinous liquors, or other intoxicating compounds, with the date of such sale or gift, and shall file the prescription upon which such sale or gift was made, and that he will conform to all requirements and restrictions as are set out in said permission. Said bond shall be in the penal sum of \$100.00 and shall provide that the same shall be forfeited to the City of Forest Grove in case of violation of any of the conditions thereof.

Sec. 4. It shall be unlawful for any registered pharmacist or registered assistant to sell or give away any spirituous, malt or vinous liquors or other intoxicating compounds except on a written prescription of a registered and practicing physician, and no more than one sale or gift shall be made upon the same prescription.

Sec. 5. Every person who shall sell or give away any spirituous, malt or vinous liquors or other intoxicating compounds, under the provisions of this act, shall keep a record in which shall be entered the names of all persons to whom such liquor was sold or given, the name of the physician issuing the prescription and the date of such sale or gift, and shall file and keep the prescription upon which such sale or gift was made, and such record together with the prescription so filed, shall be open at all times to the inspection of the Mayor of the City of Forest Grove, or of other person authorized by the Common Council to make investigation.

Sec. 6. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or give away under the provisions of this act, more than one pint of spirituous, malt or vinous liquor, or other intoxicating compounds upon any prescription; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the sale of any standard medical preparation or patent medicines in the original bottles, containing not to exceed one quart; and it shall be unlawful for any person to sell or give away any spirituous, malt or vinous liquors or other intoxicating compounds to minors or habitual drunkards, or to any person who is at the time in a drunken or intoxicated condition, and it shall be unlawful for any pharmacist or registered assistant, to sell or give away spirituous, malt or vinous liquors, or any other intoxicating compounds to any person who has at a previous time on the same day purchased any spirituous, malt or vinous liquors or other intoxicating compounds at the place of business where said pharmacist or registered assistant shall be employed or in charge.

Sec. 7. Any person having obtained a permit under this ordinance to sell spirituous, malt or vinous liquors or other intoxicating compounds may sell

in quantities of one gallon or more, pure alcohol for scientific or manufacturing purposes, wines to church officials, for sacramental purposes, or alcoholic stimulants for medicinal purposes, but he shall first require and have the applicant wishing to make such purchase to sign the following application:

APPLICATION FOR PURCHASING LIQUORS.

Name of applicant.....
Place of residence.....
Kind and quantity wanted.....
Purpose for which wanted.....

And I further state on my honor that the liquor for which this application is made is wanted for the purpose above set forth and not to be used as a beverage.

Place for applicant's signature.....
And the registered pharmacist or the registered assistant shall endorse said application as follows:

Believing that the above application was made in good faith, that the applicant is a person of good repute, and that the liquor will be used only for the purpose specified, I have supplied the same. Signed by pharmacist.....
Forest Grove, Oregon,..... 1904.

Said application shall then be filed the same as the prescriptions required by section 5 of this ordinance.

Sec. 8. It shall be unlawful for any registered pharmacist or registered assistant holding a permit under this ordinance to sell or give any spirituous, malt or vinous liquors or other intoxicating compounds to any person after being notified in writing by the father, mother, wife or daughter of such person or by the City Marshal, "That liquor must not be sold to such person" named in said notice.

Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of the Mayor to appoint some suitable person to visit and inspect the register and filed prescriptions, kept by all persons having obtained permission to sell spirituous, malt or vinous liquors, or other intoxicating compounds, such appointment shall be made in writing and approved by the Common Council and such appointee shall hold his position at and during the pleasure of the Mayor, and it shall be the duty of such person so appointed to make an inspection at least once each month of the record and prescriptions filed by each person having obtained permit under the provisions of this act, and to make a report in writing to the Common Council of the result of each of his investigations, and to report any violation of this ordinance by any person holding permit, found upon such investigation; provided that if no such person has been appointed and is acting in such capacity, then it shall be the duty of the Mayor to make such investigation and to report the condition of each investigation and any violation of this ordinance in writing to the Common Council.

Sec. 10. No complaint for a violation of this ordinance shall be filed by the Recorder of the City of Forest Grove, until either the Mayor, Marshal or person authorized and acting as inspector under the provisions of this ordinance, shall endorse his name upon the complaint.

Sec. 11. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction be punished by a fine of not more than \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the city jail of the City of Forest Grove for not more than 30 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 12. This ordinance shall be in force on and after noon 12 o'clock of February 1st, 1904, and upon its passage and approval by the Mayor of the City of Forest Grove.

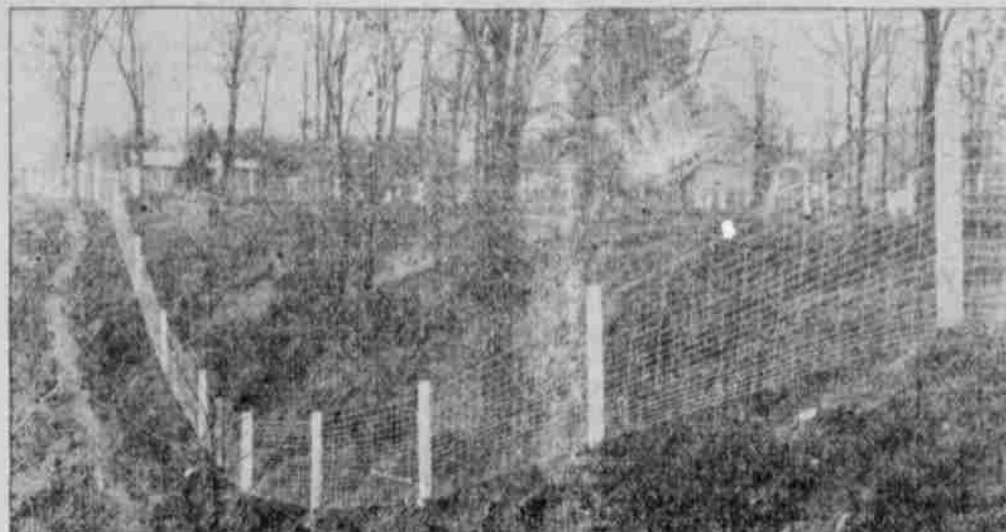

For handy reference in these drug stores the prescription names for the more commonly called-for remedies are hereby given. See. Mentri is the well known cure for

snake bite, Spts. Vin. Gal. is the same thing usually but is labelled brandy, Vinus Portensis port wine, Spts. Juniperus gin, Spts. Vin. R. et. alcohol unless distilled water is added when it is spiritus tenuior but the water is seldom distilled. Then there is Perry Davis' Pain Killer, Hostetter's Bitters and the ever-popular Meat and Malt (the first part of the name in allusion perhaps to the cork having been washed in beef tea, but the malt is there strong enough to make up for the other deficiency). These patent medicines can be bought in any quantity, but only a pint a day of the other can lawfully be gotten at one store, by the same person, so the consumption of the crude article is restricted to one and a half quarts each 24 hours as there are now only three prescription places. This would enable Forest Grove to do its full share toward keeping up the annual drink bill of the nation for 137 gallons or a little over four barrels is the yearly allowance under the present ordinance for medical purposes, evidently provision having been made for the Keeley Institute re-locating here. Sixty years ago the annual per capita consumption of whisky in America was 2 1/2 gallons but it has gradually decreased to 1 1/2 gallons, owing to the increase in the use of beer.
