### The Local Paper.

The death of a near friend to us is a more important event than the earthquake which overwhelmed whole cities in South America and changed the contour of the western coast. The prevalence of some epidemic in our own community, though it be not very malignant, is of more real concern to us than a war in Europe which will subvert the existing boundaries of that great division. The weight of events is to an extent determined by their distance or proximity, and regarded in this light a local paper, whatever its politics or predilections, is of more concern to the community in which it is issued than is the most extensive and influential New York daily. It is a matter of greater interest to us to learn the particulars of the burning of the residence of a friend in an adjoining township than to have known ten days after the event the exact number of the killed and wounded at the battle of Solferino. The proceedings of the board of county commissioners touch the affairs of every resident of a county far more weightily than do the deliberations of the British parliament, or even the actions of our own congress. Why is it then that you find men that cannot realize the importance of sustaining a home paper? Such men will take a weekly published somewhere on the Atlantic coast, and will be ignorant of the time when the circuit court holds its session in their own county, when perhaps they have a case pending in that tribunal; and will be totally oblivious of a burglary perhaps, that is perpetrated on the next street, and will be blissfully unconscious of a suicide just across the town line, or a murder in much closer proximity. Such men are the constant prey of predatory patent right men, and the natural victims of any cunning man that penetrates to the interior. If they undertake a journey they go to the cars at the wrong time; they take a train which conveys them exactly the way they don't desire to go; they are constantly being swindled by cabmen and porters, or being done by drivers. They stop at the poorest hotel and pay the highest price; in fact their whole tour is a constant progress of misfortune and misadventure, the tax that ignorance incessantly pays to villainy and stupidity. At home they pay the highest price for what they buy, and sell their labor or the products of it at the lowest; they never know the condition of the markets or who has been or who is going to be elected. In full, the man that does not take and pay for his local paper in this Twentieth century should be regarded as a relic of a past generation, as he is.

When the friends of these same men die, they expect as a matter of course that long obituaries will be written for them, detailing their lives and recounting their virtues; if they erect buildings or buy farms, marry or die, commence business or make a journey, are burned or robbed, remove or arrive, plaintiff or defendant, or whatsoever they do, they expect to be congratulated or condoled with on every occasion whether in this world or in the next. Every public improvement is to be noted, every project conducive to the prosperity of the community is to be advocated, existing evils pointed out, professional pride is to be soothed and personal vanity tickled; the local paper is expected to do and say all this and a vast deal more, and sometimes leave unsaid things that would sound unbecomingly; and yet you find men who expect to obtain these benefits too penurious to assist in sustaining their paper; and some men who have borrowed his neighbor's paper the day before, and obtained there some single piece of information alone worth a year's subscription, will tell him that he cannot afford to subscribe.

Let public spirited men remember that the character of their town abroad depends to a great extent upon the papers published thereat.

H. M. Cake, president of the Portland Commercial club, may become a candidate for United States senator on the republican ticket. The man that runs against Mr. Cake will have to take his dust most of the way and come up lower at the finish, for he is popular, genial, a witty and brilliant speaker, and fully capable of conducting with honor any position within the gift of the people.

In another column, under the head of "Candidates Announcement," will be found the card of W. M. Jackson, our present efficient county treasurer. He asks for re-election on his merits as an official alone, believing that his services as treasurer have been entirely satisfactory to all concerned. At the last session of the legislature the salaries of every official in the court house, excepting judge and treasurer, were raised, but Mr. Jackson continued to transact the business of the office for \$50 a month, though he has to put up a bond of \$40,000, and many of his friends believe he should be given the position for another term, even if the pay is small, for he needs it. If elected, he promises to fulfill his duties faithfully, and respectfully asks republican voters to remember him at the primary election in April.

### S. B. Huston for Congress.

The Advertiser has the pleasure of announcing the name of Hon. S. B. Huston, of Hillsboro, Washington county, as a candidate for the nomination of Congressman from the first district of this state.

Mr. Huston was born in Washington county, Indiana, in 1858, and is now 48 years of age.
