A. J. Jennings, of Lane county, candidate for state treasurer on the republican ticket, was in the city Tuesday circulating his petition for nomination, which was filled in short order. Mr. Jennings is a native of Iowa, and came to Oregon in 1852. He has been an active republican all his life; has served two terms as chief clerk of the lower branch of the Oregon legislature; has the endorsement of the Grange and Labor organizations of the state; is an active and prominent member of the Grand Army, and is the only member of that organization seeking a state office. There is no question as to his qualifications for the important position.

A gentleman from Portland, who has spent the past month traveling over pretty much all of Oregon, said to us this morning: "I have put in the past month or more in different sections of the state, and my business has brought me in contact with all kinds of people. You would be surprised how rapidly James Withycombe is growing in favor as the coming republican candidate for governor, even in the strongholds of the other aspirants. And I want to tell you right here, and I am not alone in the opinion by a long ways, that James Withycombe, of Corvallis, is the only man mentioned up to date that can skin George Chamberlain to a finish in the race for governor."

Senator Fulton, under date of February 13, writes from Washington as follows: "At dates to be fixed later in the spring or summer, one mile of road is to be built under government supervision on each side of the Cascades, in the state of Oregon. The judges of Umatilla and Marion counties have agreed to provide the labor and materials, specifications for which will soon be agreed upon by an engineer for the government and the county courts named. This work is to be undertaken at the most propitious time, the benefit of national experience will be offered, and it is the hope of the officials of the Public Roads Bureau that all persons in Oregon who are interested in this vital question will attend during the demonstrations. To this wish I add my most solicitous request. No other work could be done at this time so well indicating the high plane of Oregon progress, as that showing our interest in good roads. Nothing could be done by our people in other lines that would command greater attention of the home-seeker and the home-builder, for by these standards does the eastern farmer judge our opportunities in Oregon. The government promises to have present its best road engineers, with the most modern grading and road-building implements. Samuel Hill, connected with the government bureau in an advisory capacity and president of the Washington Good Roads Association, and Judge John H. Scott, president of the Oregon Good Roads Association, will attend to the work in both parts of the state, bringing to the scene as many as possible of their good road workers. I will be pleased to know that the county judge and commissioners of every Oregon county has arranged to attend one or both of the demonstrations, bringing with them all of their prominent road men. This fact would be an encouragement to the government officials in the first instance to continue in a departure that is certainly in the right direction, and would result in the officials of the state who control and make our highways receiving a practical demonstration of the very latest and best work known to the revived science of road-building. As soon as the government engineers have ascertained from the judges of Umatilla and Marion counties the best date for this work, I will communicate the same to you, and in the meantime will be ready to furnish all possible information, and co-operate in every way, that these demonstrations of work and cost may be given the widest possible educational influence throughout the state of Oregon. The first work to be done in the Northwest will be done at Pullman, Wash., and I think it is probable that Pendleton, Oregon will be the scene of the next demonstration. The work at Salem will not likely be undertaken earlier than the middle part of May. Surveys and consultations regarding specifications will be finished soon, and in course of the present month I can probably announce the exact date for the demonstrations."

The total number of voters registered at the clerk's office up to 4 o'clock yesterday was 1,550.

Sheriff Taylor, of Umatilla county, arrived in Salem Wednesday with his former deputy, C. P. Davis, and landed the latter safely in the penitentiary, where he will serve a term for embezzling public funds. Moses Taylor, who tried to burn a neighbor's barn, was also taken to the penitentiary from Umatilla county.

William Hall, an owner of a small hardware mill at Rochester, twelve miles from Centralia, Wash., was held up Wednesday night while driving from Centralia and robbed of nearly \$300. Hall said the robbers, two in number, had held him up and made him get out of the rig. One of the robbers then struck the horse to make him run away.

congress the more efficient he becomes and the more power he wields for the good of his state.

The Street Cars.

It was expected that on the 15th the Union Railways Company would purchase at public sale the balance of the holdings of the Traction Company in the Portland, Hillsboro and Forest Grove street car line, but for good and sufficient reasons the sale was postponed and thus the matter stands. Mr. Evans, president of the United Railways Company is anxious to build and will do so as soon as the transfer can be legally done. His company wants a right-of-way along Front street in Portland and it looks as if they would get it. At a meeting held in that city Wednesday afternoon applications for a right-of-way on that street asked for by the Willamette Traction Company, United Railways Company and Thomas McCusker and a good deal of discussion followed.

The Oregonian of yesterday morning says, in part, of the remarks of Larrabee and Evans:

W. D. Larrabee, of the United Railways Company, then proceeded to make a logical plea for the claims of his corporation. He cited the fact among other things that he had never asked for a franchise in his life but that the road had been built, and called attention to the magnificent Los Angeles street railway system as proof of his ability in that regard.

J. Whyte Evans, president of the company, also spoke along similar lines, but deplored their limited local acquaintance, claiming that it was somewhat of a handicap on their efforts. There were business men in Portland, however, urged Mr. Evans, who were aware of their financial standing, and in addition their recent investments were an evidence of good faith. He contended that it was not business to tie up \$50,000 in a bond, claiming that they could use every dollar in legitimate investments.

Attorney W. T. Muir likewise spoke in favor of the United Railways Company, setting forth in detail the advantages that would accrue to Portland thereby and hinting mysteriously about railway connections with valley points at no distant day if they got the franchise.

Thomas McCusker was the last speaker, and created considerable commotion by the announcement that if the franchise could not grant himself and associates a franchise that they should do the next best thing by giving it to the United Railways Company, which he looked upon as second only to his own in point of good faith and reliability. McCusker seemed to think the Willamette Valley Traction Company men were promoters more than anything else, but he had made a personal investigation of the affairs of the United Railways people, he said, and found them all right.

At this writing it is impossible to forecast the outcome of the proceedings, but the general sentiment among the councilmen is in favor of permitting both the Willamette Valley Traction Company and the United Railways Company to use the same track in their local operations.
