The Storm.

From all parts of Oregon come reports of the Sunday and Monday storm more or less severe and the damage to fruit and grain will be considerable. In this section, the storm consisted chiefly of a biting wind which blew from the north and northeast, and at times became almost a gale. The cold was so severe that water pipes all over the city were frozen, though the thermometer no time registered below 2° above zero. Yet the change was a surprise to the "oldest inhabitant," and mittens, overcoats and wool caps were taken from places where they had been stored for years and put to good use. The flowers are frozen stiff and gardening, which was being done by many of our citizens, has been temporarily suspended. Just how much damage has been done to fruit trees cannot be estimated for some time, and opinions are greatly divided on that.

The news of the Forest Grove fire and the blaze at St. Johns on Sunday reached this city by telephone, and in consequence our people used the utmost care with their stoves and furnaces, and no alarm was sent in while the high wind lasted. The request for help from Forest Grove took quite a number of regular firemen and considerable of the city's fire-fighting apparatus, but new men were enlisted and had a blaze started up anywhere about town, men and means would have been quickly on hand. While no snow fell here, it is reported to a greater or less depth in nearly all sections of the Northwest and was accompanied by the same gale. So far no great damage has been done to the crops, the dispatches say, and should mild weather follow this cold wave, stockmen and fruitgrowers will suffer no great loss.

At The Dalles the storm was severe and much anxiety is felt by all fruit and wheatgrowers. The mercury went down to 20 degrees above zero. The lowest temperature reported from Waco county was at Shaniko, where it reached the zero point.

At Baker City sheepmen estimate that thousands of sheep have perished in the snow storm, which raged from Saturday to Monday nights. The snowfall was the greatest ever recorded since the weather bureau was established there sixteen years ago, the fall being 19 inches on the level and four and a-half feet in the mountains. The fruit and grain is not damaged.

At Heppner, in Morrow county, the thermometer dropped almost to the zero mark and froze up water pipes all over town. In the Sand Hollow country 8 inches of snow fell. Stock is well protected and have plenty of feed. It is the general opinion that grain has not been materially injured. Early fruit in the lower altitudes will be killed. The thermometer went down to zero Tuesday morning at Heppner and there is a fuel famine, dealers being entirely out of coal.

At McMinnville the storm was severe and the thermometer dropped below the freezing point. Early peaches will be injured, as some varieties were in blossom; also a few pears. The apple and prune trees escaped with little damage. Snow melted as fast as it fell at Medford. Almond trees, which are in full bloom, were not injured. At Phoenix 14 inches of snow fell.

Considerable snow fell at Roseburg, but melted as fast as it fell, and little damage was done, though some peaches will be killed if the weather turns cold. The storm and cold damaged crops in Gilliam county. It is thought grain is destroyed in the Blackfoot country and will have to be sown in the spring. Sheepmen believe their flocks are safe. Sixteen inches of snow fell at Klamath Falls, and the mercury went down to 10 above zero. Stock on the range suffered, but no heavy losses are reported.

It was extremely cold at Canyon City. The roads are blockaded and ice will bear a man's weight in the valley. Feed is growing short and some loss to calves and early lambs has been caused by zero weather.

Seaside has been having all kinds of weather. Friday the mercury stood at 70, and quite a number of persons went in the surf bathing. Bluebirds sang and all thought spring had come. Saturday the cold wave swept in, freezing everything solid.

In Eugene considerable snow has fallen, but melted as fast as it fell. It is not believed fruit is damaged to any great extent. As far as is known the injury is confined to tender vegetation. The wheat crop is not injured about Dallas, though the mercury dropped to 24 degrees above zero, and the damage to fruit is nominal. Early peach trees are in bloom and some damage to them may result.

Rain saved the situation at Independence, though the peach and pear buds are frozen, but it is thought the apple and prune trees are safe.

The mercury dropped to 23 above zero at Astoria and the wind swept in from the bar at terrific velocity, cutting like a knife.

The only damage reported at Oregon City was to early varieties of fruit, much of which had already blossomed.

JONATHAN BOURNE, JR.,



Republican Candidate for United States Senator. Champion of Statement Number One.

Jonathan Bourne, Jr., candidate before the Republican primaries for the nomination of United States Senator in Congress, for the long term commencing March 4, 1907, was born in New Bedford, Mass., on February 23, 1855; was a member of the class of 1877 at Harvard University; came to Portland May 16, 1878; was a Republican member of the Oregon Legislature in the session of 1885 and the extra session of 1886; was one of Oregon's delegates to the Republican National Committee from 1888 to 1892, and a delegate to the Republican National Convention of 1902; and was elected as a Mitchell Republican to the Oregon Legislature in 1896.

Mr. Bourne has been more prominently identified with the development of the mineral resources of Oregon than any other man in the state, having expended in the last twenty years over \$1,000,000 of his own money in the acquisition and development of Oregon mines.

While Mr. Bourne has had his residence and main office at Portland since 1878, he has had another office at New Bedford, Mass., and has carried on the business of his father's estate since 1889, which makes him familiar with many of the large interests and leading men in the East. These qualifications, in conjunction with his tremendous energy, originality, executive ability and experience in business and political affairs pre-eminently qualify him for making an able and influential Senator for the State of Oregon.

Mr. Bourne has always favored extending the direct power of the people over their government as far as possible. He was one of the leading spirits in the Initiative and Referendum movement from 1896 until it was approved by the voters at the June election in 1902. In 1904 he was a member of the executive committee of the Direct Primary Nominations League, and holds the same position with the People's Power League at this time. In all these movements he has been one of the few to guarantee the necessary expenses of preparing and proposing their measures to the people.

He says that the choice of United States Senator should be by direct vote of the people, and that the Legislature should be compelled to elect the man the people select. To accomplish this result, he is championing Statement No. 1 of the primary election law as the only method by which public opinion may be crystallized and made effective upon the Legislature.

In his petition he says:

Liberal Appropriations for Panama Canal, Coast Defenses, River and Harbor Improvements, including Columbia, Willamette Rivers, Coos, Yaquina and Other Oregon Harbors, Cello, Government Canal at Oregon City. Fair Share of Irrigation Fund for Oregon. Loyal Support for Successful Candidates. Rigid Enforcement Statement One. Roosevelt for Second Elective Term. I desire that the following statement be printed after my name on the nominating ballot:

I will support President Roosevelt's determination that Justice Be Done All Men."
