After you have done this and received a reply, go to your home merchant, get his prices, deduct the cost of transportation on the goods you are wanting to buy of the mail order house, and see if it is not more to your advantage to trade at home. The result of this little investigation will awaken a new loyalty to local institutions is a fact which needs no amplification.—Exchange.
