The wrought iron pipe for the ditch from the Condenser to the Tualatin river, a distance of one and one-quarter miles, arrived on Monday and has been placed on the ground. Work on the ditch will begin at once and the pipe, which alone cost \$2,700, will be laid as rapidly as possible, so as to be ready for the mammoth pump which will be installed as soon as it arrives. When in working order this pump will furnish an abundant supply of pure water for the rapidly increasing demand of the Milk Condenser.

Beyond passing a few bills and making arrangements for some street work, little was done at the council meeting last Tuesday night. It was expected the street railway franchise matter would come up for action and for that reason a large crowd of people were present, but they were doomed to disappointment. Mayor Cornelius announced that as no representative of the United Railways Co. was present the whole thing would be laid over until a future meeting, and upon motion the council adjourned to next Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock.

The Portland Telegram tells of a new enterprise for this city. That paper says that contracts will be closed in a few days for the construction of an oil tank at Hillsboro with a capacity of 25,000 gallons for the Pacific Railway & Navigation Company, and later a smaller tank to be used as an auxiliary at Tillamook. E. E. Lytle, president of the road, was the first man in the Northwest to burn oil on engines, when at the head of the Columbia Southern he introduced and demonstrated the value of liquid fuel in this region. The Astoria & Columbia River railroad has practically all of its engines equipped with burners, and the longest line in Oregon that has not announced a change in fuel is the Corvallis & Eastern, extending from Detroit to Yaquina Bay.
