

Women Should Desire to Vote.

It is contended that women do not wish to vote. This may be true, doubtless, of a few women who have no property interests, and are not concerned in any employment outside of every agreeable family relations, and who are not inclined toward much intellectual activity, and practically the same may be said of men of a corresponding class, by many of whom the right to vote is not looked upon as worth using. But I assert it to be true that the great class of women, who are under the necessity of having some concern about their livelihood, and who have, as a great majority of the strong, active, thinking women of this country have, a really heartfelt interest in the social welfare, sincerely desire to vote. If they are silent upon the subject, it is because they have lost hope in the realization of their political equality, or because, not being schooled to combat, they do not care to identify themselves with a fight. If you will consult simply the desire of women, you will find the charge that they do not want the suffrage to be baseless. And whether they want it or not, if by extending it to them you can raise up a new and powerful interest in the most vital concerns within the state, you should not hesitate to place upon them the duty of contributing what they can to the social welfare, even though they might accept the obligation with heavy hearts. The right to vote is not a public amusement to be enjoyed as a privilege, it is rather the citizen's conscientious labor for the state. If by voting we determined merely what individuals, as such, should hold office, the task might be handed over to the office-seekers themselves, with no harm to the people.—Prof. Harry E. Kelly.

W. W. Marsh, a native son of Washington county, and a candidate for the office of County Judge of this county, subject to the republican primary election to be held April 20, was born in Centerville in 1858, and has grown up from boyhood in this vicinity. He is a son of John and Rebecca Marsh, pioneers of 1832, and has been identified with Washington county for almost half a century, has watched its growth, worked for its best interests, and has an undying faith in its future, and is familiar with its needs. He was a member of the Oregon legislature in 1896, the special session of 1898 and the regular session of 1899; has been school director in his district for twelve years, secured his education in the public schools of this county, and asks for election to the important office of judge solely upon his qualifications as a man fully competent to perform its duties, with credit to himself and with justice to all. Mr. Marsh's occupation is a farmer and dairyman and lives on his farm at Centerville, where he was married in 1878 to Miss Dora Lyon, of the same place. They have six children living. Tongue, at which 24 ballots were cast to nominate; has been a delegate to about every county convention for the past ten or twelve years and was chairman of the last republican county convention. He was also a speaker in the campaign of two years ago.

JONATHAN BOURNE, JR.,



Republican Candidate for United States Senator.
Champion of Statement Number One.

Jonathan Bourne, Jr., candidate before the Republican primaries for the nomination of United States Senator in Congress, for the long term commencing March 4, 1907, was born in New Bedford, Mass., on February 23, 1855; was a member of the class of 1877 at Harvard University; came to Portland May 16, 1878; was a Republican member of the Oregon Legislature in the session of 1885 and the extra session of 1866; was one of Oregon's delegates to the Republican National Convention of 1888 to 1892, and a delegate to the Republican National Convention of 1902; and was elected as a Mitchell Republican to the Oregon Legislature in 1896.

Mr. Bourne has been more prominently identified with the development of the mineral resources of Oregon than any other man in the state, having expended in the last twenty years over \$1,000,000 of his own money in the acquisition and development of Oregon mines.

While Mr. Bourne has had his residence and main office at Portland since 1878, he has had another office at New Bedford, Mass., and has carried on the business of his father's estate since 1889, which makes him familiar with many of the large interests and leading men in the East. These qualifications, in conjunction with his tremendous energy, originality, executive ability and experience in business and political affairs pre-eminently qualify him for making an able and influential Senator for the State of Oregon.

Mr. Bourne has always favored extending the direct power of the people over their government as far as possible. He was one of the leading spirits in the Initiative and Referendum movement from 1896 until it was approved by the voters at the June election in 1902. In 1904 he was a member of the executive committee of the Direct Primary Nominations League, and holds the same position with the People's Power League at this time. In all these movements he has been one of the few to guarantee the necessary expenses of preparing and proposing their measures to the people.

He says that the choice of United States Senator should be by direct vote of the people, and that the Legislature should be compelled to elect the man the people select. To accomplish this result, he is championing Statement No. 1 of the primary election law as the only method by which public opinion may be crystallized and made effective upon the Legislature.

Loyal Support for Successful Candidates.
Rigid Enforcement Statement One.
Roosevelt for Second Elective Term.
I desire that the following statement be printed after my name on the nominating ballot:
