The Condenser's New Engine.

The new Fairbanks-Morse 15-horse power engine, which has just been put in by L. W. House for the Oregon Condensed Milk Co., was started up last Sunday and works like a charm. This splendid piece of machinery is located on the banks of the Dairy Creek, just 5,700 feet south of the factory. A 6-inch steel pipe runs from the river to the engine, about 100 feet distance, and to the engine is connected a 5-inch pipe, of the same material, which runs along a ditch to the huge tank at the Condenser, nearly a mile away. The ditch was commenced about three weeks ago and work of laying the pipe was pushed as rapidly as possible. Last Saturday evening found everything in readiness to start up the machine and send a flow of pure Dairy Creek water through the mile of pipe to the condenser, but for various and unavoidable reasons the power was not turned on until Sunday afternoon, when quite a crowd had gathered to watch the operation. At about 6 o'clock the spark was applied, the great wheel started, and in forty minutes by the watch a stream of water was pouring into the water tank at the condenser 2,700 from the river. In reality it only took twenty-five minutes for the water to pass the length of the pipe, as the engineer shut down for fifteen minutes during this time.

More water has been a problem which has been agitating the minds of the Oregon Condensed Milk company for some time, the rapid growth of the business making it necessary that the present and future supply be inexhaustible, so it was decided to tap the Dairy Creek, and the great problem was solved for all time. Including the engine, pipe and digging the ditch, the cost to the Condenser people has been upwards of \$5,000. The Fairbanks-Morse company guarantee the engine to pump 12,000 gallons per hour, with a capacity of 15,000. Three tanks of water is used daily, each tank holding 150,000 gallons, and Mr. Schamburg, the manager, informs us that the new method will be a saving over the old of 30 cents on each tank. The engine will be walled in and the only attention it will need will be to keep the machinery well oiled and the gasoline tank filled.

It is expected that the Hillsboro bands, public schools and other organizations will assist. Hon. H. V. Gates will deliver the address.
