The Forest Grove Times of yesterday says: "At last Forest Grove is to have a train service between here and Portland that will leave little to be desired. Decision was reached yesterday by the railway people that they would give us another and arrange the hours so that passengers can go either way about every two hours during the day. The present through trains will remain as they are, but the extra which has been leaving here at 12:30 and returning at midnight will now make two round trips. It will leave here at 9 a. m. and 1 p. m. and leave Portland at 10:30 a. m. and 7 p. m. every day except Saturday and on Saturday night it will leave Portland at 11 p. m. The time card is not out yet but those will be about the hours adopted. It will be seen that the train stays here starting at 9 goes down and back twice during the day, giving a service about every two hours. The new street car line giving easy access to the depot is about as handy as a regular interurban electric line.

Death of Mrs. Pauli.

On Monday last occurred the death of Mrs. Anna Matilda Pauli, (nee Lenzler), at her home in this city, after an illness of the past seven or eight years of paralysis. She was born in Doylestown, Bucks county, Pennsylvania, February 13, 1847 and was married to Frans Carl Pauli in Washington county, Kansas, February 28, 1872.

At 12:30 o'clock on that date Mrs. Pauli was placed on the bed for her usual midday nap. At 3 o'clock when her daughter, Mrs. Schmeltzer, arrived, she had not yet awakened, and when the lady carefully opened the door to look in, her mother was lying on her face. It had been impossible for her to move her body for years, unaided, and the daughter hastened to turn her in a more comfortable position. As soon as she touched her, she knew that there was something wrong, but hoped the patient could be revived. A physician was summoned, but she was beyond call, and had ceased breathing some time before, heart failure having come on while she was sleeping.

Mrs. Pauli was converted at a camp meeting near North Amherst in 1859, and joined the Evangelical association. Later she joined the United Evangelical church and has lived a consistent Christian life. She leaves besides her husband, F. C. Pauli, three children, Mrs. G. H. Downing, of Verona, Or.; Mrs. H. D. Schmeltzer, this city and Franz C. J., at home. Four children are dead. The funeral took place Wednesday from the residence, Rev. Pratt, of Portland, conducting the services. Burial was in Hillsboro cemetery.
