Sunday School Convention.

One of the most pleasant of the seventeen annual conventions of the Washington County Sunday School Association was held at Bethany, Thursday, June 7. Boyd. Both talks were followed by discussions. Those who stayed for the evening session enjoyed a splendid address by Rev. C. L. Hamilton, of Hillsboro, on "The Sunday School Teacher as a Soul Winner." The following resolutions were adopted by the conventions. Resolved—

1. That our most heartfelt thanks are due to the members and friends of the two churches whose guests we are today, for their most cordial welcome and hearty hospitality, and for the bountiful provision for our physical welfare in a feast unsurpassed in the history of Sunday school conventions.

2. That we hereby express our thanks to the executive committee for the excellent program which they prepared, embarrassed as they were by the loss of two of our most efficient officers and Sunday school workers in the county.

3. That we recommend that in the future the reports from different schools be sent to the secretary several days before the annual convention in order that as full a tabulated report as possible may be made to the convention, and that as soon as possible after the convention the complete report of the Sunday schools of the county be published in the county papers.

4. That we recommend that the Sunday schools in Washington county be urged to make a greater effort than ever to increase the attendance of all classes both old and young, upon the weekly sessions of the Sunday school—emphasizing the mission of the Sunday school as a Bible training department to the church, for the old and middle aged no less than for children.

Weather Report.
The weather during the past week was unseasonably cool, due in a great measure to the excessive cloudiness that prevailed. As the week progressed temperatures rose gradually, until at the close they were above the normal throughout the greater portion of the section.
