The following report of a successful school year is taken from the records of B. W. Barnes. The teachers engaged by the school board Saturday evening are as follows:

Principal, B. W. Barnes; Eighth grade, Anna Chalmers; Seventh grade, Mrs. M. C. Casey; Sixth grade, Lucy Humphrey; Fifth grade, Ethel Norman; Fourth grade, Jennie Beamish; Third grade, Tennessee Weathered; Second grade, Rose Wilcox, and Primary, Mrs. Pittenger.

Number of pupils enrolled 383; number of days absent 4016; number tardy, 520; number tuition pupils, 19; amount tuition collected \$168.05; number days taught, 175; number of holidays, 5; and number of visitors, 112.

Great credit is due Earl House and Mattie Wilson for their capable librarianship, not a book being lost or destroyed during the year and all worn books have been repaired and fines collected. Following is the treasurer's report: Amount paid for books in 1905, \$83.32; from fines for books, \$1.55; from entertainment, \$10.30; and from 1906 graduating class, \$7.00. The value of the library property is \$157. This is the second year of the library in the school. This year will be the first of applying the tax for the purchase yearly of fifty or more dollars worth of books bought by the library commission. E. B. Tongue gets the Championship Cup at the Hunt Club Races.

Oregon Kid Wins by 40 Yards.

At the hunt club races in Portland last Saturday the horses from Hillsboro certainly made a good showing. E. B. Tongue rode Our Choice in the first race in which any Hillsboro horses were entered—the seven-eighths dash. Our Choice was an easy winner over Paul Jones, owned by Mr. Laurs, and Mrs. Bullman's Will Wehrung. Our Choice was first away on the start and to muddy roads went wide at the turn. Lazarus on Paul Jones took opposite tack and by running close to the pole saved distance but made better going. This lost the race for Paul Jones as Our Choice was at his side before he got straightened in the stretch and forced him to keep in the dirt track which was his undoing, for he had to run neck and neck for a quarter, when Jones dropped back and was hopelessly beaten. Our Choice won by 75 feet and Tongue looking back over his shoulder. Mr. Tongue paid \$15 for Our Choice.

FIVE-RODS DASH.

Was won by John Boggs, owned by H. H. Herdman, Jr., and ridden by E. B. Tongue. Five horses led the start, Billy Davis' Slim, ridden by C. H. Leadbetter; Tom Fox ridden by Joe Muehe; Bob Proudly owned and ridden by V. S. Howard and Mike Wisdom ridden by its owner, Thos. H. Tongue, Jr. Again E. B. Tongue was the first to get away with Slim at his shoulder. Boggs found firm footing about 5 feet from the rail, compelling Slim to take the route that proved a grave yard for the chances for Jones in the preceding race. The sponge and Boggs opened with a gap of 40 feet and finished that with the good. Slimy second and Mike Wisdom who got a poor start, finished very fast and was third by a head.

THE DOWN-FALL OF MORENO.

The big upset of the day was the down-fall of the big sorrel favorite, Moreno, whose owner keeps him for the sole purpose of field day meets, and never allows him to take part in the killing cross country runs which made Oregon Kid so popular with the lovers of that kind of going. The unmerciful beating of Moreno and J. H. Bennett by Oregon Kid, the little iron horse that has been trouncing them all in the cross country events of the club, was the surprise of the day. Moreno and J. H. Bennett have proved their worth on the turf against some of the greatest horses on the Pacific Coast. \$1,000 was paid for the latter at the age of one year. Vince, Racine and Bob Crawford were California horses with records and all looked like winners. Leadbetter who owned Bennett, was not backward in saying before the race, "There will be nothing to it but Bennett." Few thought the Hillsboro horse could win. It was a fine bunch of seven that stood before starter E. M. O'Brien for the event that was to decide the championship for the club. The fall of the extreme outside of track led off on the start with Vince who shot out three lengths ahead at the turn. Kid and Sunshine followed neck and neck at a killing pace, the rest of the bunch far lengths back. They kept this position on the home stretch, Kid fighting for his head. As they passed the grandstand Kid filled up the gap that had separated him from Vince. Around the first turn they flew every bound bring Kid nearer the lead, and as they passed the mile and a quarter post spectators saw Kid's rider drop lower in the saddle and in a twinkling the death struggle commenced. Kid had Vince in the same rack that brought disaster to Slim and Jones and landed the other race for Kid's rider. The rest began to sing out and the mile and a half had Vince on the grill. Tongue quickened pace this and three eighths of a mile from the wire; Vince showed signs of distress and it was then Tongue sized up the situation and "got busy in earnest. Kid made the last turn at a terrific pace 3/4 lengths ahead of his closest combatant and finished a winner by 40 yards over Racine, Vince Bob Crawford, Moreno, Bennett and Oregon Sunshine, finishing in order named. Thus finished the greatest race ever run in Oregon, and too much credit cannot be given E. B. Tongue for his great ride on the winner.
