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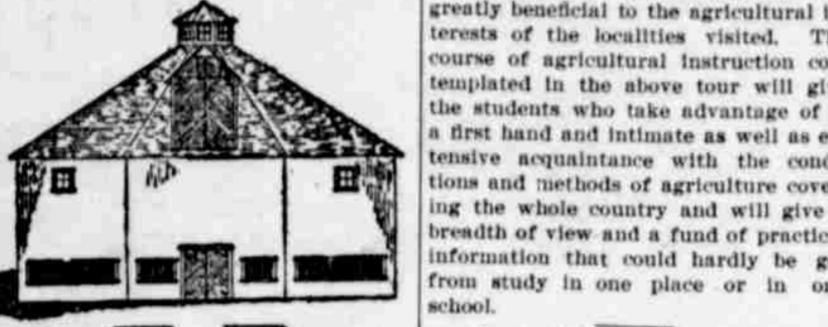
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FARMS AND FARMERS



An Eight-Sided Barn.
Here is a plan for a barn of the eight-sided or octagon shape. This octagonal barn is 25 feet on each side, providing accommodation for about fifty head of cattle.

There is a considerable gain in floor space when the octagon form is used instead of the square form, the same amount of wall enclosing a greater number of square feet. The main objection to an eight-sided barn is that it is difficult to fill with a hay fork or sheaf carrier. This may be largely overcome by erecting a gable on one of the sides of the roof and running a track in room that height, which may be extended to within 20 feet of the opposite wall. The roof requires to be self-supporting and to secure this the plates should be bolted together at the corners and held by a band of iron 4 feet long, bent to fit and solidly bolted so that the corners can never spread. Use some things which the brush goat will eat: Hazel, crab, blackberry, cedar, hemlock, holly, willows, haws, buck, squawberries, hickory, sage brush, elder, groundwood, sunflower, ash, grape, jacksack, mahogany, pine, maple, fir, rosebush, cherry, alder, salal, apple, poplar, all kinds of oak, plum, elm and many others. As to weeds, everything appears to be to their taste, even to the poison ivy, which some breeders say they eat safely, provided they have a variety of other weeds to vary their diet. Browsing gives the venison or game flavor to the flesh, and for that reason is to be preferred; fed as sheep or cows, the flesh has the mutton flavor.

Fumigating the Orchard.
The insect tax upon this country's agricultural interests is something stupendous. Indeed, were it not for the ravages of insects, great and small, the life and profits of the horticulturist would be so attractive as to completely change the present attitude toward their occupation. The government experts are doing an enormous amount of educational work in determining the exact organisms that are responsible for each particular form of damage and the best method of combating same. Fumigation is one of the modern farmer's magic science wands by which, in a

trick, he clears his crops of insect life that if not held eradicated would probably destroy his entire crop. In California immense balloonlike arrangements of canvas are used in fumigating fruit trees, and now a Texas inventor proposes to modify the plan, with the idea of making it available for smaller crops, such as cotton and corn. The appliance consists of a supporting truck for movement over the ground, generally by the use of horses, a combustion chamber for the formation of the fumes, or gases employed as fumigant, and a framework, adjustable as to height, and a hood covering the whole. At the rear a deflector curtain is provided, with a depending shield extending across the combustion chamber to deflect the fumes and force them into contact with the plants. With an apparatus of this general type it is possible to effectively and rapidly treat large numbers of plants, the deflector or hood extending over two full rows of plants.—Sacramento Bee.

How Are the Teeth?
Many farmers make the mistake of feeding stock food or other similar mixtures to horses when they seem to have difficulty in eating, when what the animal needs is to have his teeth cared for by a competent veterinarian. A horse whose teeth are out of order, bolts much of its food because it cannot masticate it, hence the food taken does little or no good and the animal loses both flesh and energy. If the horse is trying to eat and is not keeping up its vigor better look to its teeth, for in nine cases out of ten here is where the trouble lies.

The Pleading Garden.
If you have a garden it carries with it the satisfaction of going out early in May and gathering radishes, lettuce, young onions and spinach. A few weeks later early peas and beets are there for the taking. By the Fourth of July early potatoes, sweet and nutty, after a fashion never found in any store, can be dug. In succession follow snap beans, crisp cucumbers, tomatoes, corn that is sweet in some things more than name and muskmelons, fragrant, melting, delicious.

"FREE LINE" GARDENING.

Why the Shabby Guest's Likes and Dislikes Should Be Consulted.
The garden of free lines, provided only it be a real garden, under a real government, is to my eye, an angel's protest against every species and degree of tyranny and oppression, and such a garden, however small or extensive, will contain a large proportion of flowering shrubbery, says a writer in the Century. Because a garden should not, as Mrs. M. says, be a lady's face, hair, lips—of any size! No, that is true of all gardening alike; but because with flowering shrubbery or gardening can be more logical than with annuals alone, or with only herbaceous plants and evergreens.

So, then, our problem—where to plant what—may become for a moment a question of the free-line garden. The response of the free-line garden will be, of course, "Remember, concerning each separate shrub, that he or she—or it, if you really prefer the neuter—is your guest, and plant him or her or it where it will best enjoy itself, while promoting the whole company's joy." Before it has arrived in the garden, therefore, learn—and carefully consider—its likes and dislikes, habits, manners and accomplishments, and its friendly or possibly unfriendly, relations with your other guests. This done, determine between whom and whom you will seat it; between what and what you will plant it; that is, so as to "draw it out," as we say of different or reticent persons; or, to use it for drawing out others of less social address. But how many a lovely shrub has arrived where it is host or hostess, or both, had actually forgotten its name! Did you know how to introduce it to any fellow guest or whether it loved sun or shade, loam or dryness, leaf mold or sand, wetness or dryness; and yet should have found all that out in the proper blue book (horticultural dictionary) before inviting the poor, mortified guest at all.

"Oh, pray be seated—anywhere. Plant yourself alone in the middle. This is Liberty garden."

LOST ON A WOOD THING.

Gold Needles in Surgery.
A steel hypodermic needle is never inserted without leaving a permanent blue speck in the skin of the patient, probably because of the, perhaps, very small quantity of impurity—rust or otherwise—which it contains. The gold needle invariably leaves no mark whatever.

Appreciating these facts efforts in which surgeons particularly have been interested have been made for years to contrive a process for hardening gold so that it could be used for the blades of the instruments of surgery of all kinds. This is just what Dr. Vaughn has accomplished after eighteen years of experimenting and research. His method consists of the employment of heat and chemicals, but the tempering process does not make an alloy of the precious metal.

Pure gold tempered by this process remains pure, but the surgical instruments which Dr. Vaughn is now manufacturing and which are beginning to be used extensively in hospitals and by practicing physicians and surgeons are of fourteen karat's fineness, these being as efficient, but not so costly, as instruments of the purest grade of the metal. Aside from its use in surgery, which is the feature of this new invention which appeals first, the perfection of Dr. Vaughn's process is of world-wide importance in many branches.

It will probably work a revolution in many avenues of practical mechanics and make the name of its inventor as famous as that of Tesla or Edison.—Lanslet's.
