The places visited by the troops after leaving Portland were Oregon City, Liberal, Silverton, Salem, Dallas, McMinnville, Gaston and Hillsboro.

The Latest Steal on the Wilson River Toll Road.

The Washington court, in spite of the petition of over 140 of the leading taxpayers of Forest Grove and Gales Creek, leased to John McNamer, six miles of the Wilson river toll road. He was to charge 25 cents for a two-horse team, 20 cents for a single rig and 15 cents for a horseback rider. He was to charge no toll unless Tillamook county was charging toll.

McNamer has now put in a toll gate at Wm. Lee's place near Gales Creek and charges people \$1.50 for double rigs and \$1.00 for single ones. Anyone who is posted and will only pay 25 cents goes through for that rate. Mr. J. Young, of Hillsboro paid \$2.50 for his two vehicles, Mr. Cornelius paid \$1.50 and Mr. Tew \$1.00 for his rig. The toll gate keeper assured them that what they had paid would bring them over and back. Thus are Washington county's citizens bilked. A drummer from Portland, who was posted, paid 25 cents and went through for that. The tickets are all given for "a continuous trip east," instead of west, as they should be. Why is this?

The men in charge of the gate, evidently banking on the fact that people have more respect for a woman, hare put Mrs. Lee in charge, thinking perhaps that they will thus be immune from arrest.
