Willard N. Jones, member of the Oregon legislature of 1903, wealthy contractor and timber dealer, was found guilty of conspiracy to defraud the government in Judge Hunt's court and sentenced to one year on McNeill's Island and to pay a fine of \$2000. Thaddeus Stevens Potter, a well-known Portland lawyer, who was jointly tried and convicted with Jones, was sentenced to six months in the Multnomah county jail and to pay a fine of \$500. The United States court seems to be grinding out justice with a free hand these days, and no guilty man seems to be able to escape.

Geo. A. Morgan informs us that the switch track for the Hillsboro Lumber Co., one mile above Banks, is now ready for the steel. The large donkey engine, which is a 9 1/2 x 10, 30,000 pounder is here and ready for use. It is the largest and best engine ever brought into Washington county. Sixty thousand pounds of new cable is also on the grounds, and the expenditure to the company for this equipment represents an outlay of \$30,000. If anybody is in doubt about the erection of the new saw-mill by the Hillsboro Lumber Co., the fact that work in the woods is being pushed to the utmost ought to settle the question for good. Work on the mill near the Southern Pacific track will commence just as soon as the railroad company has decided where the new depot is to be built.

As we go to press the trial of the State of Oregon against Samuel Daniels, of Gaston is on trial before Justice Bagley. It is charged that Daniels stole \$15 from the pocket of Jas. McClaran, of Eugene, who is visiting at Gaston. During the trial evidence was produced that goes to show that gambling is an every day occurrence in the saloons at that place, the proprietor and bartender taking a hand in the game, and if the evidence is true, the peopple is pretty well in the game, for when he takes in the case, the case came to a close at 4 o'clock and Justice Bagley discharged the defendant, as the evidence did not show that he had taken the money.

Two Portland boys, Thomas Reeves and Hugh Saxon, the former 18 and the latter 16 years of age, shot and killed William Powell, an aged umbrella mender, at Cottage Grove last Sunday evening. The lads had money with them and robbery does not seem to have been the motive of the crime. It is said that dime novel reading and cigarette smoking is responsible for the deed. The boys were arrested near Drain and taken to Eugene where they will be confined until the November term of court. Reeves has confessed that he did the shooting, but gives no reason for the terrible deed. The boys declare that the dead man's ghost is haunting them night and day and they are in constant fear. Young Saxon was trying to devise some means to commit suicide while in jail at Cottage Grove, and now both of them have to eat their meals without knives and forks.

Divorce Suits Filed.

Rosie Crosby has filed suit for divorce against her husband, Arthur Crosby, giving for grounds that her husband has been guilty of cruel and inhuman treatment by threatening to kill, and by calling her all sorts of vile names and throwing missiles at her. There are two children, 13 and 11 years of age. She asks for a separation and the custody of the children.

Meta Oester also files divorce proceedings against her husband Joseph Oester, giving her grounds as cruel and inhuman treatment, and calling her vile and obscene names. That he has not properly provided for her and caused her to work out to help support his family and pay his debts. Thos. H. Tongue is attorney for plaintiff.

Machine Shop for Hillsboro.

L. G. Weidewisch, of Cornelius and George Hill, of Portland, were before the Board of Trade Wednesday evening with a proposition to buy the Benson machinery in this city, combine it with the machinery in the shops at Cornelius and move all to the old foundry site near the Southern Pacific depot, if the citizens will take \$700 in share of stock of the company. The following communication from W. J. Benson, was read, and fully explains the proposition:

Hillsboro, Oregon, August 8, 1906.

To the Hillsboro Board of Trade:

Gentlemen—It is proposed by Mr. L. G. Weidewisch and Mr. George Hill, in the event of \$500, and take the same in stock of said corporation, if the citizens of Hillsboro will subscribe and pay for the balance of said \$1500, in stock, to wit: \$700.

Mr. Hill is a machinist from Portland and speaking for the company said if the shop was located at Hillsboro, from ten to a dozen men would be employed. A committee of three, L. W. House, Geo. A. Morgan, and B. P. Cornelius, was appointed to examine the shop at Cornelius, look over the machinery in the Benson shop here and to decide as to the value of the land where the foundry is to be located and report at a meeting to be held this Friday evening in Attorney George R. Bagley's office at 8 o'clock.

J. Whyte Evans, one of the original promoters of the United Railways Company, announces that he will retain his small block of stock in the concern, as he regards the property too valuable to part with. It was expected at the time of the purchase that Mr. Evans would sell his holdings. Work is progressing rapidly on the preparation of the advertisements of the bids for the construction of the eleven and one-half miles within the city limits. They will soon be ready for publication. The announced intention of the United Railways is to push the construction work within the city first, then complete the lines in the country surrounding Portland.—Oregonian.

While returning from a trip to Garibaldi, where they had been enjoying an outing, Mrs. C. H. Bowman, Mrs. W. P. Scott, of Fairview, and Mrs. J. M. Farris and the latter's little daughter of Forest Grove met with a serious accident, which resulted in all of them being badly bruised. While descending from the summit on the Wilson River road, Tuesday afternoon in a hurry down by one horse the harness broke, and horse and vehicle were precipitated down an embankment a distance of thirty-five feet. Mrs. Farris and the little girl jumped, escaping with a few slight bruises.
