New stock of Comforts at Hoyt's.

At the recent Oregon Press association resolutions were adopted expressing sympathy with the woman suffrage movement and the intention to make the coming campaign of and by the women of Oregon. Various other matters of interest were included in the resolutions. Relative to the anti-pass law the editors pledged themselves to support it to the letter, but protested against its misconstruction as applying to advertising contracts. The legislators of the state are to be urged by the association to enact legislation causing the proper publication of legal notices in newspapers of general circulation and to end the practice of posting them upon trees. Work of the Oregon Historical society is commended and the resolutions declare in favor of the erection of a building for the society by the state, to be known as the state historical building.
