The line, if built, will connect with the Salem line, now under construction by the Oregon Electric Co., the successor of the Willamette Valley Traction Co., near Bertha, would be twenty-two miles long, built of 70-pound steel rails, and would cost \$1,000,000. The Hillsboro Pharmacy.

Work has been commenced on the Oregon Electric Railroad Company from Tualatin to Wilsonville. Grading is under way and the construction will be hurried so as to have it ready by March 1st. This will give the company connection with the Southern Pacific at Tualatin, so steel needed for the line in the Valley and for structural purposes on the Wilsonville bridge, can be delivered more easily. Under the present arrangement material is hauled to Salem and there turned over to the company for delivery on its own line beyond Chemaga.

Roselear, the fishman and wife beater, was up before Justice Bagley last Monday in Judge Goodin's court for examination and placed under \$1,000 bonds to keep the peace. As he could find no one to go on the bond he was returned to jail, where he will probably remain until his wife is given a divorce, which she is praying Judge McBride to give her during this term of court. The children have been sent to the Boys and Girls Aid Society and as soon as the much-misused wife is given her decree the family will be entirely broken up.

A petition was presented from residents of Road District No. 14, for division of road district, was continued until the January, 1907 term.

Willis Ireland presents his monthly reports as recorder, which was approved. Receipts, \$308.05.

E. J. Godman files his report as county clerk for November and the same was approved. Receipts for the month, \$286.80.

It being shown to the court that a part of the land assessed to W. J. Raymond was erroneously assessed and sold for taxes for the year 1902 to Washington county, it is ordered that certified of said sale to the county be annulled.

It appearing that Geo. E. Bagley made an overpayment of \$4.03 on tax, it is ordered that he be given a refund for that amount.

E. J. and J. J. Kuratli being the lowest and best bidders for the extension of the tax roll, the contract was given to them at the sum of \$300.00.

Mrs. Nancy Watt's bill for 356 loads of gravel at 5 cents per load taken from Gales creek, was disallowed.

The petition of C. W. Barr et al for petition for the location of county road, was ordered submitted to Hon. Thos. A. McBride, for his opinion. Judge McBride's opinion being received, it is ordered that said road petition be received and that Daniel Baker and Herman Kamna be appointed viewers and with Levi Walker, surveyor, and the 18th day of December, 1906, at 10 o'clock of said day to view and survey said road and to assess damages, if any.

It is ordered that the county clerk cause the publication of the delinquent tax list on the 1905 tax roll, the same to be published in The Hillsboro Independent and the Hillsboro Argus, the price per line for said publication to be not larger than the price paid in 1905.
