He gave as an excuse for leaving home that Portland looked good to him and he wanted to see the sights of a great city. He is now at home reciting his startling experiences.

The remains of Carey D. Snyder, which has remained in possession of Undertaker G. A. Patterson since being brought here after they were found in the mountains, were buried in Odd Fellows' cemetery yesterday. It was thought that the body would be conveyed to Kansas City, but since the death of R. M. Snyder, father of the murdered man, the widow has changed the plans. And thus drops the curtain on a mispent life, which was the cause of much misery, shame and a big bill of costs for Washington county. The record of the life of Carey D. Snyder proves "that the wages of sin is death."

Mention was made last week of the burning of the home of Mrs. Conley, and the cause was given that children had set the blaze while playing with matches. Mrs. Conley called at this office Tuesday and requested that a denial of this be made. She wishes it denied that the fire was caused by a defective flue and got quite a start before it was discovered. She states that she lost all the clothing of herself and children, except those in the wash. Also pictures, certificates and letters, and says the loss to herself and husband was great. In this connection the family wish to return their sincere thanks to the Odd Fellows and Rebecca, the Aid Society of the Methodist church and all others for their kind gifts and help in the hour of need.

The Jas. Thorne Dramatic Co. has been holding forth at the Crescent theatre the first three nights of this week. Their bills were "Rip Van Winkle," "The Diamond Robbery" and "East Lyna." Mr. Thorne is first-class and can make good anywhere, but he has buckled onto a bum bunch. He informs us that his two leading men left him while laying over in Portland, and he picked up the present incumbences in the Rose City. New members will join the company in Independence, the next town. He is booked out of Utes, N. Y., and is well recommended all along the line. Mrs. Thorne is from Canton, O., and is acquainted with a number of the friends of H. T. Hagley, who is also from that place.

A. W. Anthony has filed complaint in the circuit court against the Hillsboro Gold Mining Company, a corporation, alleging that on or about the 31 day of February, 1903, J. W. Shute, Wm. Hare and A. C. Shute signed articles of incorporation of the Hillsboro Gold Mining Company and filed copy thereof with the Secretary of State, and that the capital stock was named as \$6,000, divided into 6,000 shares of stock of \$1.00 each. That the plaintiff purchased 1,000 shares, by delivering to the company an option on a mine for \$200 and the balance by services performed for said corporation in compliance with a contract, he being an expert mining man. Mr. Anthony wants the stock immediately delivered to him properly signed, or a decree against the corporation for the value of the shares of stock, and such other relief as the court seems proper and equitable.

"A Portland daily has this to say of a colored 'lecturer' who spent some time in Hillsboro and the surrounding country trying to get a hall in which to tell of his experiences in the West Indies. His appearances were against him and the people did not take kindly to his statements. There is no question but he needed the clothes, for the suit he had on, while here looked as if he had worn it around the world, but there is some doubt about his having the \$11. But here is his experience in Portland: D. J. H. A. Z. Swackhammer, a colored, itinerant preacher reported to the police last night that he had been held up and robbed near the county hospital at 5:30 p. m. by three armed thugs, who relieved him of \$11. Swackhammer, who is a native of the West Indies, states that he delivered a lecture in a schoolhouse near Hillsboro Friday night, and his share of the proceeds amounted to the sum named. Desiring to secure new raiment upon reaching Portland, he decided to save the train fare and walk to this city. When at a point between the county hospital and the brickyard he was stopped by three men and ordered to deliver his valuables. While one of the highwaymen kept him covered with a revolver the other two searched his pockets and annexed the proceeds of the lecture. The victim of the holdup was unable to give a good description of the road agents, as he says the affair happened so quickly that he did not get an opportunity of looking at his assailants. Swackhammer preaches on missionary work, and declared that instead of sending missionaries to convert the heathen in the islands some attention should be paid to converting the frequenters of the county road between the hospital and the brickyard."

It will be noticed by reading the proceedings of the county court, published in another column this week, that the road tax has been levied at 1.75 mills. The levy last year was 3.53 mills, and this reduction has caused a great deal of comment, favorable and otherwise, principally otherwise. Some claim that a greater tax should have been made and the permanent improvement of the roads commenced at once and continued year after year until the highways were in a condition to permit travel at all times of the year. Others declare that the levy is high enough, and if the money is expended properly the roads can be improved in a creditable manner and the taxpayers have something to show for the outlay. Judge Goodin was in favor of making a higher levy so that it would be possible for the county to purchase a traction engine and dump cars, which would carry rock from the quarry to the road and lasting work done from the very start. These engines and cars are used extensively in the East and letters to the Judge from county officials who have made roads with them year after year, pronounce them a perfect success and the only real solution of the good roads problem. Judge Goodin has studied the road question from every point of view, before and since he went into office, and he is firmly convinced that to make good roads in Oregon rock must be used, which will cost money, but the improvement will be permanent, and that is what the people of this county demand at the present time. They are tired of putting good hard money into a few mud holes and repeating the performance every year. Hardly a taxpayer will object to the expense, if it is reasonable and there is something to show for their money. Commissioner Batner says that he did not vote for a lower tax because he wanted to cut down road work, but he declares that there has been between \$10,000 and \$13,000 on hand for the past three years which has never been used, except for the banks to fight over to see which will handle it. He declares that he is in favor of permanent road work, but is opposed to raising any more money than is necessary until a start is made in that direction. When that is done, he says, he will be willing to urge a larger tax. We understand that Commissioner Buchanan holds the same view as does Mr. Batner as it refers to the appropriation of funds for road purposes.
