## THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

COMPLETE PROCEEDINGS.

List of Bills Audited and Allowed—

Adjourned to Saturday,

March 16.

The county court met on Wednesday, March 6, with Judge J. W. Goodin and Commissioners W. J. Butner and C. B. Buchanan present. Following are the proceedings in full:

The petition of Jacob Halverson for refund of tax was granted amounting to \$1.50.

Ordered that \$35 be transferred from Road District No. 17 to Road District No. 30, and that one-third of the district road fund on the 1906 tax roll for District No. 18 be transferred to District No. 30, and that one-half of the district road fund of 1906 for District No. 14 be transferred to District No. 29, and that the sum of \$42.65 be transferred from District No. 14 to District No. 29.

Bids for fill on the Canyon road opened and read as follows: A. A. Mead, \$138; E. C. Crocker, \$120. Contract let to the latter.

Ordered that the sheriff refund \$1 04 to William Bragden, paid in error.

Sheriff ordered to reduce the valuation on property of Hillsboro Co.-Op. Co. to the amount of \$800, and that one-quarter of all taxes collected on said company's building and lot be refunded for the year 1906 to 1905 inclusive, and that the treasurer hold out from the Hillsboro city fund and from special school fund one-quarter of all taxes into said funds from such erroneous assessments.

Ordered that the sum of \$3.79 be refunded to Estella Horon for taxes paid in error.

The petition of Albert H. Lette, for refund of taxes and cancellation of 1906 assessment was granted, and ordered that the sum of \$20.47 taxes and costs for the year 1905 be refunded and that assessment of 1906 be cancelled on the N W 1/4 sec. 10, T 1 N R 6 W.

## STATE'S GROWTH IS WONDERFUL

EVERY SECTION PROSPEROUS

The Colonists Rates Are Bringing the People to Portland at the Rate of 1,000 a Day.

A contract has been let by the Portland Commercial Club for advertising which will reach about seven millions of readers, making prominent the low colonist rates to this state, and giving special attention to the agricultural resources and possibilities of Oregon.

The general passenger agents of all the different roads unite in the belief that we are to have an especially large immigration, and urge not only the commercial and industrial bodies of the state, but all citizens, to bear in mind that these rates will continue until April 30th, and it is advisable for them to see their station agents, and get the exact facts, and write to acquaintances, friends and relatives in the older states. These rates have been given on several occasions in these columns, but it is well to repeat the fact that tickets from Kansas City and all Missouri river points, St. Paul and all that portion of the Northwest, including the Dakotas, as well as Nebraska, Kansas, portions of Oklahoma, Missouri and Iowa, can be bought to almost any point in Oregon for \$2; from St. Louis for \$3; from Chicago for \$33 and from New York for \$50.

Building operations reported from all points in Oregon show greater activity than at any time in the history of the state. The smaller districts, as are the cities, and in many districts of the state new farm houses are being erected and more substantial improvements are being made than for many years past. All the irrigated districts of the state are receiving many home-seekers, and the valleys and more thickly settled sections are entertaining a good many visitors who are looking for investments of every possible character.

## WILL CAUSE A PANIC

SO SAYS PRESIDENT STICKNEY

He Predicts That Hostile Legislation Will Bankrupt Railroads and Cause Tremendous Panic.

A Washington, D. C., dispatch of the 12th says that A. B. Stickney, president of the Chicago Great Western Railroad company, who has just arrived at the national capital, in an interview discussing the railroad situation, said:

"The people are now laying the foundation firm and strong for a tremendous panic. The crisis may not come for the next two years, but it will certainly come and will be more disastrous than the panic of 1893. If the present railroad agitation is kept up, all the railroads are threatened with bankruptcy and in 1909 hundreds of thousands of men will be thrown out of work. The great unrest in the financial world is not due to the policy of President Roosevelt, but is brought about by hostile legislation by the various state legislatures, who have taken up the matter where the president left off and seem vying with each other in trying to reduce rates and make other regulations in regard to the methods of conducting railroad business which are entirely inconsistent with each other and the regulation of the federal government. This has brought about a condition of affairs which threatens disaster in the immediate future. The railroads are already finding the greatest difficulty in obtaining sufficient capital to complete the improvements now underway and to pay for additional rolling stock which has already been contracted for.
