Dear Sirs: In reply to your letter of the 4th inst. I am glad to be able to report that the results obtained from the use of your Phoenix spray were very satisfactory indeed. I tested it by diluting one gallon of spray with ten gallons of water, also by diluting one to fifteen. The diluted sprays were applied thoroughly in February to trees that were simply infested, and even the weaker solution has apparently completely eradicated the pest from sprayed trees.

A final examination made about two weeks ago fails to reveal any living scale upon either fruit or leaves. (Signed) A. B. CORDLEY.
