As soon as the blossoms begin to fall from apple and pear trees they should be given the first treatment of summer spray as a protection against codling moth. The best mixture for the purpose is Paris green, with lime and blue vitriol. In other words, the summer strength of the Bordeaux mixture with Paris green added. The Paris green poisons the insects and the vitriol acts as a remedy against scab and other fungus diseases that mar the appearance of apples and pears. Fruitgrowers should send to the Oregon agricultural experiment station at Corvallis for a copy of bulletin 75, on insecticides and fungicides, which contains directions for making spray mixtures of all kinds.—Oregonian.

On Tuesday Assistant District Attorney J. M. Wall made complaint before Justice H. T. Bagley against L. J. Palmateer and H. A. Walker for violating Sec. 1908, Chap. 8, of Belling and Cotton's Annotated Codes and Statutes. The complaint charges that the defendants did on Sunday, April 21, at Hillsboro, Oregon, willfully and unlawfully keep open their certain confectionery stores for the purpose of traffic and that they did on that day sell from their stocks goods, wares, merchandise, etc., and names parties who purchased ice cream and cigars at the places named. The case was called before Justice Bagley and the defendants, through their attorneys, Bagley & Hare, pleaded not guilty. The trial is set for today at 10 o'clock before Justice Bagley and a jury. It is said that Messrs. Palmateer and Walker do not deny that they sold ice cream and cigars last Sunday, but they propose to fight the case to a finish, claiming the law is unconstitutional and class legislation, for it permits drug stores to sell cigars and forbids them to do the same. The decision will be watched for with interest by every dealer in Washington county, and it is said they are to stand their share of the expense of the suit, and if they lose in the court here, will carry it up until the matter is settled for all time.

S. G. Morgan, formerly superintendent of the water and light plant in this city, but now holding a like position in Forest Grove, was in town last Saturday. He has purchased residence property in the College town and is making a number of substantial improvements.

Claud and Roy Greer made a business trip to Wallula, Wash., last Saturday, returning on the Monday evening train. They report meeting W. P. Tucker, formerly of this city, who is up there working for the railroad company. Much has been said of that part of the country, but the Greers say, now that they have been on the ground, that a foot of Washington county soil is worth an acre of land in that locality. They believe that this county holds over anything they passed through.

The Oregonian says that work will be commenced within a short time on the bridge across the Willamette at Oswego for the Beaverton and Willsburg railroad, the Southern Pacific proposed connection between the First Side division and the main line, whereby trains are to be taken off Fourth street and the West Side traffic routed into Portland by the bridge call for the construction of two 300-foot steel spans, each will cross the river at a height of 7 feet above low water mark. The steel approaches will have a length of 150 feet. The center pier will stand in the middle of the river and will cost \$75,000 to build. It will have a height of 10 feet. The War Department has given permission to the Southern Pacific to construct the bridge having approved the plans submitted some time ago.

There is nothing new about the vineless potato business, except a new form of transferring money from the pocket of one person to another. Almost everybody has observed that little new potatoes in the potato bin in the cellar, but these little potatoes are of no value. The fraud was thoroughly exposed last year. The Patrons of Husbandry who vouched for the good quality of the vineless potatoes evidently sampled potatoes grown in the normal way."—Oregon Agriculturalist.

The Weather.

The weather during the week was very pleasant, with an abundance of bright sunshine. Light showers occurred everywhere on Wednesday and Thursday, and the rain held over in the northwestern counties during the greater part of Friday. The temperature averaged about eight degrees above normal in all the counties west of the Cascade mountains, and about three degrees below normal in the counties east of this range of mountains. In the latter district frequent frosts were reported, but they did no damage of consequence. In the western counties a few light frosts occurred on Saturday and Sunday mornings, but they were too light to cause any harm worth mentioning. The winds were generally light, but with sufficient movement to cause a rapid drying of the top soil and by the end of the week the roads were dusty, although there was ample moisture in the ground just below its surface.
