Your correspondent from South Bend might at least be truthful."

A Forest Grove special dated April 30, says: At a meeting of the business men of this city and the local transportation company Saturday afternoon definite steps were taken to extend the electric line from Forest Grove to Banks, a booming little town eight miles north of here. Homer C. Atwell presided. Enthusiastic speeches were made by Mr. Atwell, Senator E. W. Haines and others, and resolutions were adopted endorsing the sentiment of the meeting, which was for a speedy extension of the line. Walter Hoge, A. G. Hoffman, Mayor Bedford Laughlin, W. H. Hollis and J. F. Woods were appointed as a committee to secure right of way and work up the interests of the farmers along the line. It is estimated that the immense supply of milk for the local condenser and the produce in general of this rich farming country easily justifies the proposed electric railway.

Examinations for the following positions in the federal civil service will be held on the dates given below: Chauffeur in quartermaster's department, salary \$1,500, May 15; artist in bureau of chemistry, department of agriculture, salary \$10 per diem, May 22; statisticians in the geological survey, salary \$1,200, May 22; fireman (stoker) in quartermaster's department, salary \$780, May 29; electrician in quartermaster's department, salary \$1,000, May 29; laboratory assistants in department of agriculture, salary from \$600 to \$1,000 per annum, May 29; laboratory assistant in bureau of chemistry (glassblower), salary \$1,000, May 29; assistant superintendent of construction in quartermaster's department, salary \$900. Further information regarding these examinations may be had by communicating with the postmaster or the secretary of the board at the postoffice in all large cities.

The case of the State of Oregon against Loren Plalmateer, charged with keeping his place of business open on Sunday, came up before Justice H. T. Bagley and a jury last Friday and resulted in a disagreement. It is understood that three of the jury were in favor of acquittal, two for conviction and one not voting. The case against H. A. Walker on the same charge, was to have been tried Monday but on motion of J. W. Wall, the assistant district attorney, the case was dismissed, all dealers in confectionery agreeing to comply with the law. Mr. Wall explained to them that if this was done they would be permitted to sell ice cream, soda water and perishable

goods on Sunday. Last Friday the confectionery stores were open and ice cream sold to anyone that cared to purchase but no sales were made of cigars or tobacco, it is said. This arrangement is perfectly satisfactory to confectionery dealers, and from now on there will probably be no trouble in keeping the lid shut down on other articles of traffic on Sunday, which are under the ban of the law.

The 64th anniversary of the birth of American civil government west of the Rocky mountains, was celebrated at Champong yesterday. The oration was delivered by Robert A. Miller, of Portland, and brief talks were given by others. Judge George H. Barnett, of Salem, a nephew of Peter H. Barnett, a pioneer of Oregon in 1843, and the first governor of California, in 1850, presided. F. N. Matthews, now in his 90th year, the only survivor of the 102 persons who took part in the memorable event of May 7, 1843, was present and extended greetings to all.

In the saddest case which was up before Justice Wirtz court last Saturday, at Forest Grove, wherein W. W. Ryles of Seogin Valley was charged by Deputy Game Warden Mack with having dumped sawdust from his mill into Tanner creek contrary to the fish statute, the jury failed to agree, two standing for conviction and four for acquittal. The case will have another hearing.

For the information of the confectioners of this county I wish to say that I am of the opinion that the Sunday law permits the sale of ice cream and soft drinks in connection therewith on that day. I may suggest that chocolate confectioneries may be included on the ground of being perishable goods. I think, however, that these articles named fully cover exceptions under the law.

The Weather.
Fine weather prevailed during the week west of the Cascades, where cloudiness was almost entirely absent, and there was, in consequence, almost uninterrupted sunshine. To the eastward of the mountains the weather was less pleasant, considerable cloudiness, with threatening weather, prevailed at times over localities. No rain, however, occurred at any point throughout the state. Temperatures at night ranged far below the normal, owing to the constant radiation, especially over southern and eastern Oregon, in the latter district falling to or below the freezing point almost every night. Frosts were of frequent occurrence. Temperatures over western Oregon during the afternoon averaged considerably above the normal owing to the bright sunshine; but over eastern Oregon the afternoon temperatures remained below the normal. High winds occurred on several days in eastern Oregon and on one or two days near the coast; no damage was done, however, except to charge the atmosphere with an excessive amount of dust.
