

Blind from Wood Alcohol.

Wood alcohol is dangerous if you don't know just how to use it. Lee Shippey, a young man employed as proofreader for the Star, used wood alcohol to clean his pipe. A few weeks ago he became blind. The oculist said the optic nerve had been paralyzed from the fumes of the wood alcohol that had been inhaled from the pipe. The case is yielding to treatment however, and Mr. Shippey is recovering his sight.

Instances are known where permanent blindness has resulted from inhaling the fumes or swallowing wood alcohol. Many persons have died from the same cause.

"Wood alcohol exerts a powerful influence on all the nerve centers," an oculist said. "In particular it selects the optic nerve. Paralysis of that nerve nearly always affects the swallowing of that so-called spirit of inhalation of its fumes. Too much care cannot be exercised in its use."

Wood alcohol is used by many persons in cleaning, to burn in spirit lamps and for other purposes. It is much used as fuel in pyrography, or wood burning.—Kansas City Star.

Facts About Canned Fruit.

It will be in order for retailers to caution against some of the dangers careless people lay themselves liable to by not knowing some of the important facts concerning canned goods of every description, says the American Grocer.

Canned goods should not be allowed to remain for a few days, or even hours, in saucers, metal baking pans or opened tin cans. The sooner they are used after opening the better will be the flavor of the goods. Many cases of sickness, alleged to have been caused by canned goods, have been traced to eating such goods that had been left for a considerable time exposed to the air before being prepared for the table. Canned goods which are hermetically sealed as soon as gathered at the source of supply are in most cases fresher, more wholesome and palatable than many so-called fresh articles which are exposed for a considerable period in city markets. If people will avoid the many cheap goods offered, and buy only such as are offered by reliable and trustworthy dealers, they will run no risk of being imposed upon.

Says Marriage is Serious.

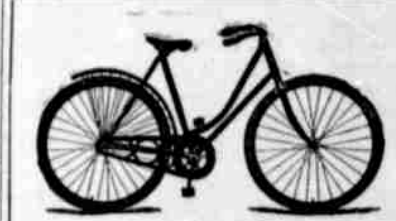
