The United States government has given up the idea of using postage stamps upon which are printed the name of the postoffice from which they are sold. It was announced shortly before the first of the present year that such stamps would be sold. Postmasters who have made a requisition for such a supply have been notified that the plan has been abandoned, at least temporarily.

At a recent meeting of the Washington County Veterans' Association a resolution was unanimously passed requesting that all games on Memorial Day be dispensed with, especially all those of a noisy and athletic nature. It is desired that the day be passed in quiet memory of the soldier dead, and horse-racing, base ball and other noisy sports do not show the right kind of respect for a day made sacred by an act of congress.

All persons coming to or born in the original territory of Oregon up to 1859, inclusive, without regard to where they now live, are eligible to membership. Pioneer headquarters at the Oregon Historical Society's rooms, top floor, where Secretary Geo. H. Himes will be on hand with his genial smile and glad hand to greet old and new friends, and furnish badges up to 12 o'clock June 19. All pioneers should be at the armory at 3 p. m. sharp, where the literary exercises will take place, after which, and up to 5 o'clock, there will be a social session. Then comes the grand banquet, under the management of the Pioneer Woman's Auxiliary, Mrs. C. M. Cartwright, chairman, which will be participated in by all members present in good standing. Special invitation is extended to the husbands and wives of pioneers who may not be pioneers themselves. No children will be admitted to the banquet. Annual business meeting at 7:30 p. m., followed by an "experience meeting" in charge of Robert A. Miller, 1854, of Portland. There will be reduced railroad rates for this event.

A lad of 12 years, named Warren Mallory, whose home is in Portland, was on Monday arrested and held for an officer from that city, who arrived Tuesday and took the boy back to the city. When taken in charge here he was leading a horse attached to a buggy, and when charged with stealing the rig, denied the soft impeachment, but admitted that he "took" the rig. He wore knee pants and is said to have been an inmate of the reform school. The Journal of Tuesday evening says: "The sight of Dr. Whiting's horse and buggy standing in front of the Hotel Portland yesterday afternoon inspired 12-year-old Warren Mallory with a sudden desire to run away, and he got into the buggy and drove away to Hillsboro. By the time the boy had reached Hillsboro his desire to get away from Portland had left him, and he put the rig up at a stable. When Dr. Whiting discovered his loss he informed Sheriff Stevens, who immediately notified officers in outlying districts to look out for the stolen rig and the thief. Last night Sheriff Connell of Washington county found the rig and arrested the boy. Sheriff Stevens went to Hillsboro this morning and brought young Mallory back to this city. At the jail this morning the boy cried bitterly as he admitted taking the physicians horse and buggy. He said he had been kept in jail over night at Hillsboro. He lives with Mrs. Kline at 1176 Mississippi ave., who, he says, has cared for him since he was a baby. The boy knows nothing of the whereabouts of his father, and says his mother died when he was an infant. He was brought to Portland from Tacoma a little over a year ago by his step-mother, who took him to the home of Mrs. Kline and then disappeared. Mrs. Kline had also lived at Tacoma. Young Mallory said he had no reason for wanting to run away, as Mrs. Kline had always treated him well. Later in the day he was turned over to the juvenile

court, and the case will be disposed of by Judge Fraser."

This, in effect, is the conclusion which Attorney-General Crawford arrived at in an opinion rendered in response to a letter of inquiry for an interpretation of the new law from District Attorney John H. McNary, of the Third Judicial District. Under present conditions it is possible to obtain poisons of nearly any description in the form of compounds and solutions, especially prepared for the extermination of rats and other vermin, at seed and many grocery stores, where no record is required to be kept, and it is impossible under these conditions to trace the source of a poisonous drug or compound which may have been secured with murderous or suicidal intent.

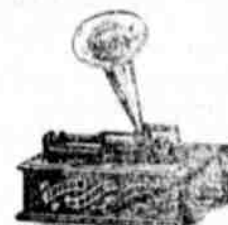
