A cheese-making demonstration made in the open street, under the auspices of the 35 cheese factories of Tillamook county, will be one of the features of the carnival and fair to be given at Tillamook City, August 22 to 24 inclusive. The management is making a successful effort to interest people and a large attendance is expected. A special boat will be run direct from Portland to Tillamook for at least one day of the fair. It is said Tillamook county people are master hands in organizing and conducting a fair. They will have a fine exhibit of livestock. There will be demonstrations of patent cow-milking machines, and other dairying and cheese-making inventions.

A wreck on the C. & E. attracted much attention in town yesterday. It happened to the east-bound passenger, consisting of a locomotive, two box-cars, a baggage and four coaches. As the train was passing upon the approach to a bridge between Blodgett and Wren the two trucks on the forward car left the rails, and the car itself was thrown cross wise of the track. The box car left the rails, but the baggage car remained on the track. The sudden stop shook up the passengers and there was a period of excitement, but no injuries. The trouble happened at 11 o'clock, and it was four hours before the passengers reached Corvallis, having been transferred to a special taken out from Corvallis by Conductor Riley. The same train passed back at six p. m. with bay-bound passengers, who were transferred. The wreckage was cleared away and all trains are on time today.—Corvallis Times.

At the meeting of the school board Saturday evening it was decided that school would commence Monday September 30th. A change in the price of tuition was also decided upon. Tuition for the first, second, third and fourth grades will be \$8 per year, the same as heretofore. In the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades it will be \$15 per year. The old price was \$12 in these departments. The ninth grade will be \$20 per year. One fourth of all tuition must be paid in advance. The teachers are now engaged for all departments. The ball game at Banks, Sunday last, attracted a large crowd from this city, about 200 R. R. tickets being sold at this station. The game was played between Banks and Hillsboro teams and resulted 17 to 13 in favor of Hillsboro. A return game will be played in this city next Sunday.

Hillsboro is now in a fair way to have all of the walks in the business part of the town replaced by cement walks. An ordinance will be passed at the next meeting of the council to that effect, and property owners begin to realize that the council means to enforce this law without fear or favor. There are now a good many walks under construction and others will soon be commenced.

The franchise of the Oregon Electric company through this city will expire in about ten days more, and as yet, the \$5,000 bond required by the city council has not been put up. The line is being built this way as fast as it is possible for them to get men for the work, and there is no doubt but what they will be on hand with the money at the eleventh hour. The bond for the United Railways also have not been filed, nor is it expected that they will put up bonds at the present time.

Prominent Grangers to Make Study of Tax Question.

State Master Austin T. Buxton, of the Patrons of Husbandry, has started to reorganize the deputy system, and has appointed the tax commission as authorized by the State Grange, as follows:

Thresher Burns Near Sherwood.

While Baker Brothers were engaged in threshing oats at a stack on the farm of Albert Voss, a farmer living one mile south of town, with a steam threshing outfit, fire was discovered on the opposite side of the stack from the separator, and before the machine could be removed to a place of safety, it was totally consumed, along with about 300 bushels of oats. The total loss will amount to about \$1000, of which Baker Brothers sustain above \$800.

San Francisco, Aug. 17.—Five cases of bubonic plague, four of which have resulted in death, have been reported to the health department within the past week. The patients with one exception were of the poorer class of foreigners dwelling in the neighborhood of the old Chinatown. Prompt and active measures were taken by the local, state and federal authorities, and spread of the disease is not feared. Both President Julius A. Simon, of the health board, and Health Officer James T. Watkins stand today that the situation is well in hand and no occasion exists for alarm. The infected steamer was ordered into quarantine with her passengers and will so remain until released by the health department. The two shacks inhabited by the other patients were fumigated, locked up and sealed. The bodies of the two Mexicans, Italian and Russian Pole, who succumbed, were destroyed in quicklime.

Land and Mineral Decisions.

The following synopsis of Land and Mineral Decisions is furnished this office by Woodford D. Harlan, Land Attorney, Washington, D. C., and under this head will be published from week to week decisions which may be of interest to our readers:

Coal Lands—On the failure of a coal claimant to perfect
