A good half-mile track could be laid out, which would answer for racing purposes. It would take considerable money to build a commodious and slightly pavilion, but we believe the citizens of both Hillsboro and the surrounding country would subscribe liberally, and once the ball goes rolling, the rest is easy. It is worth while talking about. A county the size of Washington should hold an annual fair, for it was demonstrated two weeks ago that its resources for exhibits cannot be equalled by any county in the state, and a permanent home for the fair, which could be improved and added to each year, is the very thing.

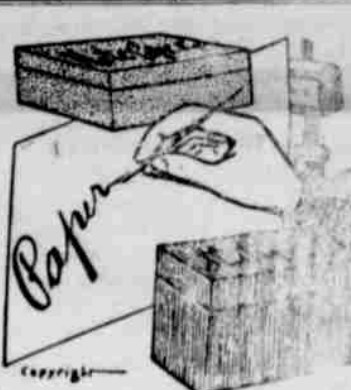
