Gov. The banks in Portland all closed promptly on Tuesday, as did most of the banks in the state, though a few country banks refused to shut up and continued business as usual. Shute Bank closed on Tuesday with the rest, but opened up the next day and is now doing business as usual, cashing checks and receiving deposits. The Commercial bank is open, but will not cash checks until next Monday. Mr. Shute assures us that there is no cause for worry and that depositors are perfectly safe. The Eastern banks owed the banks of Oregon large sums of money, but could not send the amounts fast enough to supply the demand, and it was deemed best to shut down until the East had time to get the gold to the coast, and thus prevent a possible run, which would have resulted in loss to the depositors. Money is now reaching Portland in large amounts and the "scare," if there has been one, is over.

Lynn Whitcomb arrived here Sunday morning from Alaska where he has been spending the summer. His return was a surprise to his wife and daughter, who have been living here during his absence.

The latest report from Portland says that banks all over the country are resuming business and confidence is restored. The mint at San Francisco is ordered to coin \$15,000,000 in gold; the mint at Denver is grinding out \$48,000,000 in gold bars, and \$584,000 in gold left the Bank of England Wednesday for America. So don't get rattled and draw out your coin. It is perfectly safe where it is, and out of the way of the hold-up-man.

The board of equalization met on Monday, October 21, with Hon. J. W. Goodin, county judge; E. J. Godman, county clerk, and Geo. H. Wilcox, assessor, present. After taking the required oath the board transacted the following business:

C. P. Wunderlich was cited to appear before the board on Monday, October 28, to show cause why his assessment should not be increased on tillable land to the full number of acres owned by said Wunderlich.

G. A. Lechner asks the board for a reduction in his assessment of the number of acres of cleared land and improvements thereon; continued to a future day.

M. E. Newman and Geo. T. Newman ask for a reduction of assessment on 41.97 acres in D. McCloud D. L. C. for the reason that said land has two county roads running through it; continued.

John Vanderwal files complaint that John Pierson is the owner of more land than is assessed; ordered that said Pierson appear before the board on Monday, Oct. 28, and show cause why his acreage should not be increased.

John Vanderwal also files complaint against Ladd & Reed Farm Co., that they are the owners of more tillable land than is assessed; ordered that they appear before the board October 31.
