Mrs. Effie D'Atley.

Mrs. Effie D'Atley, well known in Hillsboro as the daughter of the late Charles Stewart, pioneer of 1843, is reported dead in Montana. She was compelled to travel by stage through a portion of Idaho, and the vehicle overturned, so severely injuring the woman that it was necessary to convey her to a hospital, twenty miles from the scene of the accident. Mrs. D'Atley was wedded the second time, her first husband being the late John Jackson. Her husband, James D'Atley, and several small children survive. Of her immediate family two brothers, Charles Stewart, a Portland drayman, and John Ben Stewart, South Tualatin, and two sisters, Mrs. Andrew Jack, Farmington, and Mrs. James McClarkin, of Laurel, survive.

Birds the First Potters.

Pottery was first made like birds' nests because the art was taken from these feathered creatures, which built their little homes so perfectly and artistically. The clay lining suggested the use of this material for pottery purposes, and after trying various styles of bowls and vases made on bird's nest lines ancient potters began to originate designs for themselves. From birds' nests they advanced to urns and jugs, and eventually glazed and decorated ware found a place among the wares offered for sale to the early Egyptians. Bosts, men and women, birds and curious looking animals were the favorite decorations at first, and later on these were done in colors.
