Favors Statement No. 1.
Winona Grange at Tualatin went on record as strongly in favor of the principles of the direct primary law and Statement No. 1 at a meeting held there Saturday night. A resolution introduced by John U. Henry, president of the Grange, was adopted pledging the Grange to the support of the statement and to the opposition if any candidates for the legislature opposed it.

The meeting had been called primarily to hear an address by W. R. Harris, fruit inspector, and there was a large attendance. During the evening the subject of the primary law and Statement No. 1 came up for discussion and some very pertinent opinions were given. Mr. Henry, in his address supporting his resolution, said that the opposition to the principle of direct election of United States senators set out directly in Statement No. 1 sprang from the old machine leaders who were opposed to the primary law because it gave the direction of politics into the hands of the people of the state and robbed the bosses of their power. The plans being laid to defeat the statement and those candidates who subscribed to it were being fostered by these men who wanted to get back into the saddle of political control.

The resolution indorsing Statement No. 1 and pledging the members of Winona Grange to oppose all candidates for the legislature who did not sign for the statement met with hearty approval, several speeches being made in its favor.—Portland Journal.

To the Taxpayers of Washington County.

You are hereby notified that the taxes levied for the year 1907 will be due and payable on and after Saturday, February 15, 1908, at the sheriff's office, in the city of Hillsboro, Washington county, Oregon.

Three per cent rebate is allowed on all taxes paid previous to March 15, 1908. The first half will be delinquent after Monday, April 6, 1908. If the first half is not paid by April 6, then the whole amount becomes delinquent. If the first half is paid, then the last half can be paid at any time, up to October 1, 1908.
