In Behalf of Equal Suffrage Amendment.

No reason can be given for man suffrage that cannot be urged with equal force in favor of woman suffrage.—The late U. S. Senator J. N. Dolph.

For the occasion of Grand Lodge A. F. & A. M. and Grand Chapter R. A.
