COME BACK.

Much has been said in the republican press throughout the state in regard to the inability of democrats to legislate, where even they had a majority. However true this may be, they can now see that they were better to have kept silent on this one subject. With a four fifths membership in our state legislature, republicans have been unable to agree on a senator. Weeks have been spent trying to elect, and charges of rascality and treason have repeatedly been exchanged. The Portland machine, which has always been a power in state politics, has a party majority and the minority is trying to break the ring. Impolitic moves have been made, one of which was the readiness displayed by the anti-machine men in going into the seductive caucus. With a great blare of trumpets the legislature declared for reform, specifically, on clerkships, as an individual cause. They did reform, but not in the way to gratify constituency. It has been a fight for spoils from the beginning. Clerkships have been made as a pecuniary method whereby henchmen could fight for masters. It is not edifying, but it is truth, and the republican press should never again say aught about the inability of democrats to legislate.

TRUE DEMOCRACY.

It is a fact that sometimes a minority can control an issue in a legislature. This leads one to speculate on a contingency that might arise at Salem. Should the ballot so shape itself that democratic support would elect a republican with a reputation, "anti-corruption," and defeat Dolph, there is no doubt but the democratic minority would fall in line for the people. It would be only democratic, to vote for the lesser of two evils, even from a partisan standpoint, so long as adhering to a party candidate would block election. This contingency however, will hardly arise, but should it, the senator from this county and his colleagues will see, and undoubtedly embrace the proper opportunity. It is generally presumed, and perhaps correctly, that the populist members will not swerve from their candidate under any circumstances.

SOME DEMOCRACY.

The following is the nominating speech of S. B. Huston, delivered in the senate, January 22d, where he named Judge A. S. Bennett as United States senator. It is well worth reading, and THE ARGUS is pleased and proud to give it to its many subscribers.

Mr. President—The democratic members of this body have assigned to me the pleasant duty of presenting the name of the democratic candidate for the high office of United States senator. The democrats of this body, though few in number, and though their party has been betrayed by false leadership, are not dismayed, because they believe that the principle of "equal right to all and special privileges to none" shall live so long as free government is known to man. In saying what I shall say in his behalf I do not wish to be understood as casting any reflection upon the distinguished gentleman who has been named for that position by the eloquent senator from Clackamas. I have received favors from Senator Dolph, and for that I am duly thankful.

It may be thought by the majority that it is an unpleasant thing to belong to the minority. But I assure our friends on the other side that there are some advantages in belonging to the minority. In the first place, we were not troubled in our caucus by being buttonholed to vote for any particular candidate. In the second place, we had an absolutely secret ballot. It was not thought necessary in our caucus for any member to show his ballot before depositing it in the hat. It was not thought necessary to follow the advice of "Blocks of Five" Dudley, when he said: "Put your floaters in charge of a trusted man and see that none get away."

The man whom I shall name was raised in Oregon and spent his boyhood days upon a little farm down in Washington county. By

the force of his indomitable energy, by the powers of his genius, in spite of poverty, he has forced his way to the front until he stands today the peer of any lawyer, or any citizen, of this state. This is a high compliment to pay to any man, but I pay a higher one, when I say that he has never forgotten, and in any station to which he may be called never will forget, that he is one of the people.

I admit there are some drawbacks to his candidacy. The great corporations of this state are against him. The land-grabbers, who are trying to steal from the people an empire of unearned grants, are not for him. The railway corporations are not issuing free transportation to lobbyists to bring them here in his behalf. This magnificent lobby, the greatest ever seen in the history of this state, that has thronged the legislative halls, is not in his interest. The bankers of the state who have gathered here from Huntington to Astoria, from Pendleton to Ashland, are not here to urge his election. He would not represent these people in the way they desire to be represented; but that is because they are not satisfied with equal rights to all, but desire special privileges for themselves.

But it is urged that Senator Dolph is in favor of protection. The gentleman whom I shall name does not believe in protection for protection's sake, but he does believe in fair play. If I understand the position of Senator Dolph correctly, he is in favor of protecting every industry in Oregon except the one which furnishes the circulating medium of the country—except the one which the Shylocks of London and Wall street are interested in destroying.

The man whom I shall name believes in the money of the constitution, and believes in making atonement for the crime of 1873 that struck down silver as a money metal of this country. When a highwayman holds you up and robs you of your purse, he at least displays the manly element of courage; but when one who pretends to be your friend stabs you in the back, he commits a greater wrong. When the South fired on Fort Sumter, they were wrong, but they took their lives in their hands and displayed a courage worthy of a better cause.

But when the silver was struck down in 1873 it was done in the house of its friends. It was done at the dictation of the Barings and the Rothschilds, who now have their country by the throat. It was done stealthily and by night, and it is my judgment that it was as great if not a greater crime than the firing on Sumter in 1861, because the men who did it took no chance, but worked like a thief in the night. The man whom I shall name believes in wiping from the statute book that infamous crime. Vote for him, and Oregon will be united in a common cause. She will be represented by a man who will stand shoulder to shoulder with Senator Mitchell, with Mr. Herman and Mr. Ellis, in defense of what nine-tenths of her people believe to be in the interests of our state.

Such a man is Alfred S. Bennett, of The Dalles. Vote for him, and you will not be met at the depot on your return to your homes by an outraged and indignant constituency demanding to know why you have basely betrayed them. Neither will you be required to offer the apology that Judge Bennett put up the money to carry the election, and was therefore entitled to have the goods delivered.

I take pleasure in asking your suffrages for Hon. Alfred S. Bennett.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 2, 1894.

That there is a conspiracy in existence to make money out of the condition of the Treasury is believed by many men in both branches of Congress. Naturally members of the administration will not express their belief upon such a matter. The idea of the conspirators as understood by those who believe in their existence, is to withdraw gold from the treasury and hoard it until gold can be by its scarcity forced to a premium. Your correspondent does not undertake to make the positive statement that there is a conspiracy, but facts are such as to justify the suspicion that there is. It is known to a certainty that the legitimate demand for gold—to pay debts and for purchases in Europe—could have been met with less than one half of the gold that has been recently withdrawn from the treasury. It is perfectly clear then that more than one-half of the gold withdrawn is now hoarded in the vaults of banks and safe deposit companies. Why? It can earn nothing for its owners while thus lying idle, and the men who are credited with doing the hoarding are men who always expect a profit out of all their financial transactions. There is only one way they can make a profit out of this one, and that is to force gold to a premium. That's why so many believe they are doing that very thing, or at least trying to do it. Can congress do anything to head off such a conspiracy? It unquestionably can, but will it do so? That is a question easier to ask than to answer. If there is such a conspiracy it exists solely because of the belief

of its members that congress will do nothing to prevent its operation being successful. President Cleveland and Secretary Carlisle are thoroughly alert, and they will not allow gold to go to a premium if it be possible under the authority vested in them by present laws to prevent it, by issuing more bonds, and they are both satisfied that it will be, although they would much prefer congressional action.

Senator Faulkner, who is chairman of the committee on territories, is anxious to get the bill for the admission of Arizona and New Mexico before the senate and hopes to be able to do so in a few days. Those bills would have been passed long ago, but for the opposition of republican senators, who lack the courage to openly oppose the admission of those territories, but make use of all their parliamentary skill to kill the bills directly, by preventing their being acted upon.

Sec'y. Carlisle succeeded in getting the House to adopt two important amendments to the sundry civil appropriation bill. The first restores to the Secretary of the treasury the discretion to issue notes of such denominations as he may deem best in place of currency presented for redemption. At present he is compelled to reissue notes of the same denomination as those redeemed and cancelled. The other, which amends the law for the issue of gold certificates, provides that such certificates shall not be receivable for customs dues after July 1, 1895, and shall not be available for use as a part of National bank reserve fund and discontinues their further issue.

Sixteen out of twenty-one votes which were cast in the Senate against the Nicaragua Canal bill came from democrats, and eleven out of the thirty-one votes cast for it. Thirteen democrats were paired. Opinion differs widely as to the probability of the bill getting through the house. Only one thing is certain, and that is, that it cannot be brought to a vote in the house without an order from the committee on rules. It has been stated by friends of the bill that Speaker Crisp had partly promised that an order setting a time for a vote would be reported, but the statement has never been confirmed by a member of the committee. Even if such an order were reported it might meet the fate of the currency bill—be rejected by the House. The canal lobby is very active.

A decided administration victory was won in the Senate Saturday afternoon, when Senator Vest's amendment to the pending Hawaiian resolutions was adopted by the Senate. The Vest amendment expresses sympathy with all attempts to establish republican institutions; reaffirms the doctrine of absolute non-interference with foreign nations, and says: "That the administration of President Cleveland in maintaining this policy as to our foreign relations deserves the approval and support of the American people." The odd feature of this victory was that it was won by the vote of Senator Pettigrew, who it will be remembered was one of the republican senators who voted against the McKinley tariff bill, he having with 23 democrats voted for the Vest amendment, while 18 republicans and 4 populists voted against it. Had Pettigrew voted with the republicans there would have been a tie.

The tariff receipts of the government are rapidly increasing, thus furnishing an answer to the argument advanced by republicans, that the tariff would have to be amended in order to produce more revenue, and bearing out the estimates made by Secretary Carlisle of the new tariff as a revenue-producer.
