WASHINGTON, D. C., June 3, 1895. The Presidential boom of Hon. William C. Whitney, who as President Cleveland's first Secretary of the Navy became one of the most popular democrats ever in office, was received with open arms in Washington, as it doubtless will be all over the country.

SENATOR HUSTON'S ADDRESS.

Veterans, members of the Grand Army of the Republic, and ladies and gentlemen of Hillsboro and vicinity:— When I was asked by a member of the committee to deliver an address upon this occasion, I shrank from the task.
