REBEKAH'S ROSE FETE

Opened to the Public in the Grange Hall Last Night.

NATURE MORE BEAUTIFUL THAN ART

Hillsboro has Two Incipient Blazes and Sherwood has a \$5,000 Loss

Committee Work Moving.

Rose Carnival.

The rose carnival under the auspices of the Rebekah lodge, opened up last evening, as beautiful as a scene from fairyland. Roses and flowers, marshalled as a host, valiantly waged warfare against the loveliness of womankind present, and to the masculine mind it is yet undecided as to which army was victorious. Mrs. S. B. Huston, acting as Noble Grand, presided at the opening ceremonies. Hon. S. B. Huston and Hon. T. H. Tongue made short addresses. A solo by Prof. J. H. Stanley was well rendered, and the male quartette delivered several very fine selections, one of them being "The Old Oaken Bucket," the most covered receptacle being in plain view of the audience throughout the rendition. Instrumental music by Messrs. and Miss Rowell, of Scholls' was well received. Mrs. C. B. Brown gave a recitation which was pleasing to all, and two little ones creditably took part in the program.

The walls were handsomely decorated, and the ceiling was neatly frescoed with evergreen. The roses were beautifully arranged in the center of the hall, one table being exclusively of Forest Grove's offering. A house, moss covered, and rose clambered, the work of Miss Louise Tucker, received much attention, and the ship laden with flowers also came in for its share of admiration. The first night's fete was simply grand, and tonight's will be the climax. The Rebekahs are to be congratulated upon the success of the carnival.

Nocturnal Alarm.

About 1:30 a. m. Tuesday morning, while our citizens were in the arms of Morpheus, the clang of the fire bell loudly proclaimed the fact that somewhere in the city there was a fire which needed extinguishing. The scene of the cause of call was at the residence of S. Rosenthal. The fire originated in some unknown manner, as Mr. and Mrs. Rosenthal were awakened by the smoke coming from another apartment. It is supposed that a cat upset a lamp which was in the sitting room, although it is said the light had been extinguished before the family retired. Messrs. Burns, Bradford and Wiley assisted in putting the fire out as soon as they heard the alarm, and by the time the fire ladders appeared, all was over. It was very fortunate for the family that the fire did not spread rapidly as all means of exit from the sleeping apartment might have been cut off. Damage to the extent of perhaps \$100 on furniture, which was insured, will cover the loss. It was very gratifying to note the alacrity with which the fire department responded, 12 from the Hook and Ladder, and 9 from Vulcan Engine Companies answering at roll call.

Blaze on Main Street.

At about 12:45 p. m. yesterday an alarm was sounded on occasion of a slight blaze at the residence of Jos. Hare on Main street. The roof had caught from a spark and in a short time quite a little smudge was started. Prompt work by neighbors and the fire boys soon had the fire extinguished with but a loss of three or four dollars. The hour was a very good one for an extensive fire, as it was very warm and quite a breeze was blowing at the time. Mr. Hare was at the Cornelius picnic at the time of the blaze, and Mrs. Hare was at Portland.

Sherwood's Blaze.

Last Saturday evening, Sherwood situated a short distance from Middleton, was the scene of a very expensive conflagration. The blaze originated in the building occupied by the merchandise stock of Her & McConnell, and supposedly was caused by a defective flue. Before the flames were under control, the store building, the large hotel owned by J. E. Smock, the hall on the other side of the store and owned by Wm. Scott, a few out-buildings, and a small barber shop, were all razed to the ground. The depot was also scorched and is nearly a

total loss. The total loss of the fire is estimated to be in the neighborhood of five or six thousand dollars and it is a severe blow to the thriving little town. But a small portion of the merchandise was saved. The insurance carried on stock and building is said to be \$2,000. The adjusters arrived over there yesterday endeavoring to fix up the losses. The fire was first discovered about 9:30.

Executive Committee.

The executive committee met at the office of the County Judge last Friday morning and business was transacted as follows:

Report of Printing Committee was read and adopted. The estimate was for 1500 posters, about 24 x 42; 2000 invitation cards for the Veterans and G. A. R. Posts of county; 5000 programs, and other miscellaneous printed matter, to cost in neighborhood of \$50.

Report of Committee on Fire-works postponed one week.

Decided that Miss Lena Parker of Forest Grove be requested to read the Declaration of Independence on July 4th.

On motion it was decided that the executive committee meet each Friday morning until after the Fourth, to hear reports of sub-committees and transact the business.

A committee consisting of Hon. B. P. Cornelius, J. J. Morgan, and W. H. Wehrung was appointed to secure reduced rates on lines of rail for the reunion and celebration.

A committee was appointed on selection of Marshall for the three days session, consisting of B. P. Cornelius, W. W. Annans and Capt. A. M. Collins. To report at next meeting.

The Veterans' Ass'n. and G. A. R. committee on Reunion was in the city and with the executives visited the Warren grounds and announced them satisfactory, so far as completed.

W. S. and John Baldwin, of the Grove, made appropriate remarks, commenting upon the public spirit of our city, and the effort being made by all to be in shape to give the veterans such a welcome as will long be remembered.

The Committees on Tents and Music were granted another week's time and the committee on subscriptions was requested to make collections signed, at once.
