Seattle, Oct. 12.—Joyce Hammer, 15 years old, daughter of former State Senator Emerson Hammer, of Sedro-Woolley, and Louis Gillpop, 18 years old, all-around athlete, might have been enjoying their honeymoon today if it had not been for Christopher Columbus.

As it is, the would-be bride is sobbing as if her heart would break at the home of friends here, waiting for her father to arrive, and Gillpop is temporarily held in the county jail.

They eloped Monday, the girl wiring her mother that they were "married and safe."

But when they applied yesterday for the marriage license at Everett they learned that because Columbus had discovered America on October 12 it was a legal holiday and the court house was closed.

By this time the father had romped down to the telegraph office and sent word to sheriffs in western Washington to hold the couple if they showed up. So when they alighted from the Everett interurban here, they were taken into custody.

Boston—Foster singled to center. Hooper took first when hit by a pitched ball. Foster on second. Scott flew to Whitted, both runners were held on their bases. Speaker out, Rixey to Luderus. Foster took third and Hooper second. Gainer flew to Niehoff. No runs, one hit, no errors.

Philadelphia—Stock out, Gardner to Gainer. Bancroft singled to center. It was his second hit of the game. Paskert flew to Speaker. Bancroft out stealing, Thomas to Scott. No runs, one hit, no error.
