MASON TELLS WHAT WAR MOVES MEAN

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, Oct. 14.—The resignation of Theophile Delcasse as minister of foreign affairs of France was almost certainly due to the refusal of the British and French governments to follow his advice about the best way of dealing with the Balkans.

England's foreign secretary, Sir Edward Grey, was given control of negotiations with the Balkans. Grey's failure in the negotiations was apparently Delcasse's reason for no longer supporting the Britisher's methods.

Delcasse always was a strong advocate of prepared diplomacy. In the present instance preparedness meant the dispatch of a large army for quick action, through Greece, to check the Teutons at the Serbian border and to overcome the Bulgarians. This army ought to have been sent early in the course of the diplomatic battle at Sofia, when the allies and Germany were dickering for Bulgaria's aid. After Bulgarian mobilization began England held back, and France had to urge her before even the present inadequate expedition was sent to Saloniki.

When two men possessing such strong personalities as Delcasse and Grey do not agree, one of them must eventually retire.

It is probable that Grey counted too much on past British prestige in the Balkans to swing Bulgaria to the allies.

Delcasse, on the other hand, noticed the decline of British influence there, and urged preparation against an unfavorable decision on Bulgaria's part. Grey prevailed, however, and failed in his mission.

Delcasse's resignation is in effect a demand for an international commission which will permit no one capital in the future to control the diplomatic negotiations of the allies.

LAY KEEL FOR THE WORLD'S GREATEST FIGHTING SHIP

New York, Oct. 14.—The keel for the dreadnaught California, one of the most formidable yet planned for America's navy, was laid today at Brooklyn navy yard. The vessel, one of three authorized by congress, is the first battleship to be entirely propelled by electricity.

Secretary Daniels, the principal speaker at the ceremony, hailed this advance in naval science as epochal. "Installation of an electrical drive," he said, "ushers in a new epoch of navigation just as far reaching and important as that in which steam suc-

ceeded sail power. This vessel will have an increased cruising radius of about 50 per cent. The combination of electric drive and oil fuel will enable her to steam nine days longer and go 2,950 miles farther than a coal burning dreadnaught. It is a source of pride that America is starting the movement for electrically propelled battleships."

He predicted that the navy will eventually own its own oil lands and produce, transport, refine and store its own oil supply.

CONSTITUTIONALITY INCOME TAX LAW ARGUED IN COURT

Washington, Oct. 14.—Battle lines were drawn today in a decisive struggle over the nation's infant income tax law. Attorneys argued in the supreme court five cases, involving constitutionality of this statute.

Eighty-two million dollars of the country's revenue depend upon the decision of these cases, and even more would be involved if congress decided to increase the tax. The special point of attack was the question of the present regulation whereby incomes below \$3,000 a year are exempted. The appellants charged that this constitutes discrimination by classifying taxpayers on the basis of wealth.


Solicitor General Davis, for the government, argued that congress clearly intended to touch lightly the classes with small incomes, and bear more heavily on large incomes.

"When the government raises money by taxes," he said, "it should not bear down oppressively and unjustly on any one class. Income taxation tends to shift the burden upward."

SALONIKI IS NOW UNDER MARTIAL LAW

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
Paris, Oct. 14.—Saloniki, the landing point for allied troops bound for Serbia's relief, is under martial law at the direction of General Zarrel, in command of the French troops, and General Moschoamowios, the Greek commander there. Greek, British and French soldiers are on excellent terms, despite the perfidious protest of Greece against the allied landing. One allied detachment has reached Macedonia, en route to assist the Serbs.
