EDISON DAY IS CELEBRATED AT PAN-PACIFIC SHOW

(By United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Oct. 21.—A week of tribute to Thomas Alva Edison culminated today in "Edison day" at the Panama-Pacific exposition, with the electrical wizard as the central figure for admiring thousands.

Music and entertainment, with just a strain of things serious, marked the day. Festival hall, where the formal ceremonies were held, was packed with people. As President Moore of the exposition presented the wizard of light with a commemorative bronze medal Edison was visibly touched, but simply acknowledged his appreciation with a bow of his head.

Prior to the medal ceremonies Edison and his close friend, Henry Ford, were guests of honor at a luncheon given by President Moore and directors of the exposition.

Edison, accompanied by Ford, was followed by hundreds of school children and grown-ups on his tour of the fair grounds today. High good humor was evidenced by the inventor as he occasionally stopped to exchange a word with groups of eager children.

Tonight Edison and his party will witness a special fireworks program, arranged in his honor. Half a ton of explosives will be used and a set piece representing a mammoth model of the first electric light invented by Edison, surmounted by the inscription "1879-1915," will be touched off.

BANDITS CONTINUE TO WORK IN THE EAST

New York, Oct. 21.—Plying their trade as in the days of western hold-ups, bandits early today followed up the recent West Shore hold-up by an attempt to rob the "silk express" carrying a small fortune in raw silk. NEW ROAD OPENS IN NORTHERN WASHINGTON

Seattle, Oct. 21.—The trail of the iron horse today links Port Angeles and Port Townsend. The first train over the Seattle, Port Angeles & Western railway, branch of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, carried officials of that road yesterday. It passes through a rich timber, dairy and agricultural region on the Olympic peninsula. Seattle will be connected with the Port Townsend terminus by a car ferry service. Regular freight and passenger service will be inaugurated in a month, it is announced.

AUSTRALIA TO GET NORTHWEST PRINT PAPER

Portland, Oct. 21.—Two thousand tons of print paper, consigned to Australian newspapers and wholesalers, which are on the municipal docks waiting to be loaded on a steamer today, represents the first shipment of Oregon paper to the antipodes in more than a decade.

Portland, Oct. 21.—Charged with setting fire to her home in 1912 and collecting \$2,700 insurance, Mrs. Mary Kennedy, a dressmaker, is in jail today awaiting arraignment. Mrs. Kennedy is alleged to be a member of the arson ring which has operated in Portland for a number of years.

JAPS ARE SUPPLYING RUSSIANS WITH ARMS

(By United Press Leased Wire.) Vienna, Oct. 21.—That Japan has heeded the Russian plea for supplying her with munitions was indicated today by a war office statement which reported capture of Japanese firearms and ammunition in the Galicia struggle. This seizure was incidental to destruction of an armored train in the Padlova river region. An infantry scouting party wrecked the train after a shell from the Austrian positions demolished the locomotive 100 yards distant. Fighting in the Kolki district was reported unchanged.

WANT HIGHER WAGES FOR SAILING IN WAR ZONE

Seattle, Oct. 21.—Twenty members of the crew of the American full-rigged ship Dirigo, ready to sail for Sweden with a cargo of barley, have deserted, following refusal of their demands for increased pay for the coming voyage through the war zone. Although the American flag has been painted on the sides of the big craft, the sailors declared the hazard too great unless their wages were raised.

EXPECT VERDICT IN CHARLTON CASE NEXT WEEK

Come, Italy, Oct. 21.—The illness of Micaeli Picardi, Porter Charlton's counsel, is understood to be so improved that it was believed today he can resume his work in the case against the young American charged with slaying his wife, the former Mary Scott Castle, Californian, tomorrow.

At any rate, it is believed no further delay will be permitted. A verdict is expected next week. Attendants reported Charlton still very nervous, but as he has already told his own story of hammering the woman to death, he will be questioned only incidentally hereafter, and it is hoped he will not break down, as was feared Tuesday.

DIPLOMATIC CORPS DESERTS SERB CAPITAL

London, Oct. 21.—The diplomatic corps at Nish, Serbia, has left for Cacak, the entente ministers stopping at Crajevo (Kragevo)," according to a News Agency dispatch from Athens today.
