

JAPS ARE SUPPLYING

RUSSIANS WITH ARMS

(By United Press Leased Wire.) Vienna, Oct. 21.-That Japan has eeded the Russian plea for supplyng her with munitions was indicated oday by a war office statement which reported capture of Japanese fire arms and ammunition in the Galicia struggle. This seizure was incidental to destruction of an armored train in the Putilovka river region. An infantry scouting party wrecked the train after a shell from the Austrian positions demolished the locomotive 100 yards distant.

Although the American flag has been painted on the sides of the big craft, the sailors declared the hazard too great unless their wages were raised.
