## WOMAN LOSES VOTE BY MARRIAGE TO FOREIGNER

San Francisco, Dec. 6.—Mrs. Gordon Mackenzie, wife of the well known San Francisco singer and clubman, may not vote at California elections. The supreme court of the United States decided she was not an American citizen because she had forfeited her citizenship when she married MacKenzie. The Scotch singer never has been naturalized and is still a subject of King George. Mackenzie started the suit in Washington when his wife was refused the right to register by Register Zemaniski here recently. The decision in the Mackenzie case is far-reaching, in that it establishes a legal precedent created by woman suffrage that will guide the courts in the future.

Washington, Dec. 6.—Mrs. Gordon Mackenzie, of San Francisco, was declared by the supreme court of the United States today not to be a citizen of this country as a result of her marrying a British citizen.

## MOVING PICTURES TAKE PLACE OF SUNDAY SERMON

Tacoma, Dec. 6.—The largest crowd that ever attended a Sunday night service at the First Congregational church assembled there last night for the first motion picture and musical service ever put on in a Tacoma church. There was no sermon. Rev. Frank Dyer said today the plan had proved successful and would be continued.

"The striking feature of the motion picture service was the family attendance," he said. "Whole families came, and the children were especially interested. For two years we have tried to make the Sunday night services attractive to children and parents, and I believe that the motion picture appeal is the best solution of the problem."

## FORMER PREMIER SAYS GREEK ELECTION ILLEGAL

Paris, Dec. 6.—Election of a Greek parliament favorable to King Constantine's non-intervention policy appears certain, according to Athens advices today. Former Premier Venizelos has advised his followers not to participate in the election December 19, declaring it to be illegal.

A crisis is predicted when Venizelos is compelled to announce his attitude concerning the new parliament.

## BRITISH VESSEL IS CHASED BY SUBMARINE

London, Dec. 6.—The British vessel Japanese Prince, after a five-hour chase, in which she was heavily shelled, escaped a German submarine pursuer, it was officially announced today.

The press bureau said that the ship was attacked "recently," but that it "ultimately was brought safely to port."

The Japanese Prince is of 4,800 tons.

## SEND WARSHIP TO PROTECT VESSEL ON AFRICAN COAST

Washington, Dec. 6.—The state department today asked the navy department for a warship to protect an unknown American vessel which wirelessed from the north African coast Saturday that a submarine was attacking her. The American minister at Athens reported that a Greek steamer brought confirmation of the press reports of the attack. The cruiser Des Moines and the Collier Caesar, now in the Mediterranean, will search for the ship.

## MRS. GARM MURRAY, OREGON PIONEER, DEAD

Tacoma, Dec. 6.—Mrs. Garm Murray, aged 70, a pioneer of Oregon and Washington, is dead here today of paralysis. Mrs. Murray crossed the plains from Kentucky in 1852. Her parents died on the way and Mrs. Murray, whose maiden name was Hester Clark, was taken by other members of the family to Rickreal, near Salem, Ore., where she was reared with Congressman Nesmith's family.

## NOOSE DANGLES FOR TWO CANADIAN WOMEN

Winnipeg, Dec. 6.—Unless the government interveene, two women will be hanged in western Canada before 1916 dawns. One is Elizabeth Coward, a British Columbia woman who murdered her husband near Fort George, B. C. She will die December 23. The other is Jennie Hawkes, whose execution for the murder of her husband's paramour will take place in Calgary, December 19.

Efforts are being made to save both women from the gallows.

## NEW YORK DETECTIVES FIND BOMB MATERIALS

New York, Dec. 6.—Detectives who swooped down on an apartment in East 78th street today seized enough explosive bomb material to wreck the building. They arrested three Austrians, including a woman. The raid followed a "tip" from Chief of the Secret Service Flynn.

## VETERANS' PENSIONS NOT FOR YOUTHFUL WIDOWS

Washington, Dec. 6.—In drawing a bill to liberalize pensions for widows of the Civil war veterans, Congressman Sherwood of Ohio has phrased it so as to keep young woman who marry old soldiers from reaping the benefits.

## MANY ATTEND FUNERAL OF J. WALTER DRANIN

Portland, Dec. 6.—Last rites were performed this afternoon over the body of J. ## STOP TEUTON ADVANCE AT MONTENEGRIN BORDER

Berlin, via Sayville, Dec. 6.—That the Serbs and Montenegrins have halted at least temporarily the Teutons at the Montenegrin and Albanian frontiers was indicated by today's official statement, which mentioned only that the enemy's attacks south of Sienica and east of Ipek had been repulsed, without referring to the remainder of the borders.

## RUSSIA BUYS MUNITIONS OF AMERICAN MAKERS

San Francisco, Dec. 6.—Russia is still placing large orders for munitions in this country, despite the completion of her new huge government plant, according to E. W. Penfield, of New York, who is returning to the Atlantic coast from Russia. Penfield came via the Trans-Siberian railway and the liner Chiyu Maru.

## SLIDES IN THE CANAL STOP PACIFIC SHIPPING

Portland, Dec. 6.—No ships of the American-Hawaiian Steamship company will clear Portland for Atlantic ports until the Panama canal is repaired, according to an announcement today by C. D. Kennedy, Portland agent for the company. Because all the company's vessels are required for the Hawaiian sugar trade, the long trip to the Atlantic around the Horn can not be undertaken, Kennedy explained.

## SERBS FROM MONASTIR JOIN ALLIES VIA GREECE

London, Dec. 6.—Part of the Serbs who fled from Monastir have joined an allied expedition into the Balkan theater, via Greece, according to Salonki reports today.

## SUGAR LADEN VESSEL IS AFIRE AT HALIFAX

Halifax, Dec. 6.—The 5,000-ton sugar laden steamer Carleton, New York for Queenstown, put in here today with a fire in hold No. 2. Examination to determine the cause of the blaze was started.

## CHARGE WOMAN WITH USE OF MAIL TO DEFRAUD

Portland, Dec. 6.—Charged with using the mails to defraud a bank at Sigourney, Iowa, of \$400, Mrs. Olga Ferry, the pretty wife of Claude Ferry, of Corvallis, Ore., was under arrest here today. Federal officials allege that Mrs. Ferry cashed checks intended for another Mrs. Ferry, which came into her hands by mistake. She was arrested at Denver.

## CONGRESSMAN RANDALL AFTER THE BOOZE ADS

Washington, Dec. 6.—Congressman Randall, California prohibitionist, introduced bills in the house today forbidding shipments of liquor as interstate commerce and providing for the closing of the mails to liquor traffic ads.

## CLOTURE RULE CONFLICT WILL APPEAR IN SENATE

Washington, Dec. 6.—In the quiet which marked the opening of the senate today there was no indication of the impending conflict over cloture rules to gag the time-honored debate privilege of that body. Senator Walsh announced that, while he would not question work done under the rules of last session, he reserved the right to bring up the question whether each senate is not obliged to make its own rules. Senator Martin of West Virginia presided and swore in new senators. Senator Kern offered a resolution that the house and President Wilson be informed that the senate has organized and was ready to receive communications. Then the body adjourned to meet again at 2:30 this afternoon.

## TURKISH DESTROYER SUNK BY BRITISH

London, Dec. 6.—British submarines sank a Turkish destroyer and five supply ships in the Sea of Marmora, official announcement said today.

A submarine Friday sank the Turkish destroyer Yar Hesser outside of Izmid gulf, the statement said, but 42 of her crew were rescued.

## POST OFFICE ROBBER GETS 25 YEARS IN PEN

Portland, Dec. 6.—Sentence of 25 years in the federal prison at McNeills Island was passed by Judge Wolverton today on Bruce Granville, a Seattle barber, who was convicted of robbing a post office substation here last February.
