An advertisement now appearing in Oregon papers marks a feature of the transition of Oregon into the list of "dry" states. It shows that the dollars invested in buildings formerly used in brewing alcoholic drinks are now to be employed in the manufacture of a non-alcoholic drink, the plant at Portland thus to continue in operation, and the men who were formerly employed in making beer are now to devote their energies in making the new temperance drinks. Riggs Barn Crushed Down—

A 40x40 foot cattle barn on the J. G. Riggs farm at Selma on Monday collapsed from the weight of snow while from 30 to 40 head of cattle were in the barn. Fortunately but two of the animals were killed, the safety of the others probably being due to the hay bay keeping the timbers of the structure from falling to the ground. Mr. Riggs has not yet had a detailed report of the accident.

Lawrence J. Perdue

Lawrence J. Perdue passed away at his home on North Lawnridge avenue Wednesday night, after suffering for a year from rheumatism of the heart. The deceased was born in Missouri on April 25, 1864, being in his 52nd year at the time of his death. With his parents he crossed the plains while still less than a year of age, the family locating in Clackamas county, Oregon. In 1879 Mr. Perdue located in Douglas county, coming to Grants Pass in 1900, and had lived here since that time. For the past 12 months he had been a patient sufferer from the disease to which he finally succumbed. He is survived by his wife and by two brothers and one sister, G. G. Perdue, of Needy, Oregon, and Gilbert Perdue and Mrs. M. Cacy, of Silverton.

The funeral services will be held at the home on Lawnridge avenue at 10 o'clock Saturday morning, interment to be in I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mrs. Ash came from Colorado some days ago in order to be with her mother in her illness.

The funeral will be held at the Clark & Holman parlors on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, with interment at the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

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SALVAGE CARGO OF FREIGHTER AGROUND

Seattle, Jan. 13.—Salvaging the cargo of the Japanese freighter Kenkon Maru Number 3, aground on Belle Chain reef, between Mayne and Saturna islands, began today by Captain W. H. Logan and crew of the steamer Salvor, of the British Columbia Salvage company.

The Kenkon Maru is laden with steel car wheels and other heavy railroad equipment for the trans-Siberian railway, and was destined

to Vladivostok under charter to the Frank Waterhouse company of Seattle.
