FIRM'S BID IS ACCEPTED**

Portland, Feb. 19.—Earl B. Newcombe was so excited when he learned that the firm he represented was lowest bidder for Portland's new auditorium that he fainted. The clerk at a meeting of the city council had just finished reading the bids and then announced that Hand Pederson, of Seattle, was lowest with a bid of \$317,400.
Newcombe, Pederson's Portland representative, was standing in the council chamber with a crowd of contractors. He collapsed when the clerk made the announcement. Carried outside, he fainted twice more before he completely recovered from the effect of the news.
Pederson's bid was \$27,000 lower than his nearest competitor, and fully \$100,000 lower than the estimate made by the city engineers.
