MOVING PICTURE MAN LIKES ROGUE

W. A. Van Scoy, the moving picture artist who has been in the city for a number of days, left Monday evening for Portland, taking with him the films made here for development at his studio there. A. J. McCORKLE DIES IN MONTANA

A. J. McCorkle, a former resident of Grants Pass, who returned to Libby, Montana, last fall, when his health was fast failing, passed away on the 14th inst., and the following obituary notice was published in the Libby News:

"Captain Andrew J. McCorkle, aged 72 years, died Monday evening at 7 o'clock, at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. David Davies, on Main street, after many months of terrible suffering from cancer. Up until about four years ago Captain McCorkle resided in Libby, and was at one time heavily interested in mining properties in this vicinity. His largest holdings of later years were with J. H. Town in the Hazel T. mine, now owned by the Lukens-Hazel mining company.

"Mr. McCorkle was born in Cameron, Missouri, 72 years ago, and when a young man was appointed captain of the Missouri Volunteers, Company I, U. S. A., that fought during the civil war. Mr. McCorkle was

a gentleman of splendid characteristics, a good citizen, kind and reliable friend, and was very highly thought of in this little community. His health has been failing for a number of years and not until lately did he finally give up the brave fight that he has made and so patiently endured his suffering the past nineteen months. Besides his wife, who survives him, there are six children and several grandchildren. The children who mourn his loss are Mrs. Arthur Hall, of Bisbee, Arizona, Mrs. J. E. Farris, of Tonopah, Nevada, Mrs. Ellis Beggs, of Canyon City, Oregon; Mrs. David Davies, of Libby; Frank McCorkle, of Grants Pass, Oregon; and Charles McCorkle, of Canyon City, Oregon.

"The funeral was held from the Davies home Wednesday afternoon, at 2 o'clock, under the auspices of the local lodge of Odd Fellows, of which the deceased was a member for over 30 years. Interment was made in the Libby cemetery."
