CONGESTION OF TRAFFIC PROBLEM

New York, Mar. 6.—Willing to hear any proposal for the relief of traffic congestion, representatives of nearly every big railroad started for Washington today to attend the interstate commerce commission hearing.

The New York Central railroad representatives issued a statement declaring that cars were plentiful, but that the tracks were jammed east of Chicago because of congestion along the Atlantic seaboard. The New York Central said:
"Show us any reasonable plan for moving freight faster and we will adopt it, no matter what the cost."

Washington, Mar. 6.—A sweeping embargo on all freight, and temporary increases of storage and demurrage charges were suggested today by Howard Elliott, president of the N. Y. N. H. & H. railroad, as remedies for the traffic congestion in Atlantic seaboard states.
Elliott was one of the first witnesses at the interstate commerce commission hearing seeking relief for the congested conditions. More than 200 representatives of railroads, traffic associations and boards of trade were present.

Amidst the applause, Gardner asked Mann if he thought the United States should abandon to their fate Americans who traveled on armed ships in the event of a warning to keep off them.
Mann replied.
"When that situation arises, we ought to meet it. I hope we will never be put to the test of deciding whether we ought to fight because some fool involves us."

RUSSIANS SINK VESSELS IN TREBIZOND HARBOR

Petrograd, Mar. 6.—Russian torpedoing in the harbor of Trebizond, sink-do boats have raided Turkish shipping several vessels, it was learned today.
The raiders operated within easy range of the coast batteries, which developed only a weak fire. It is believed most of the coast batteries have been dismantled to save the guns from possible capture from approaching Russian armies.

ARTILLERY FIRE ALONG THE MEUSE

Paris, Mar. 6.—Violent artillery fighting on the left bank of the Meuse, west of Douaumont, and on the Woivre plain was described in today's official statement. No important infantry operations were reported. The French heavily shelled German positions in the Cheppy woods and along the Avcourt-Malancourt road. Elsewhere the battle front was calm last night.

Berlin, Mar. 6. Minor engagements on the east bank of the Meuse, east of Verdun, were reported in today's official announcement. The operations of last night resulted in the capture of 14 French officers and 934 men, it was announced.

Thomas E. Garrett died at Galice March 4, 1916, of tuberculosis, aged 27 years and 7 months. The funeral will be held Tuesday afternoon, at 2 o'clock, at Hall's chapel, with interment at Granite Hill cemetery. Thomas Garrett was born at Ada, Ohio, May 23, 1879, and with his brother, W. W. Garrett, went to Galice in the fall of 1904, where they engaged in mining, being owners of the Keystone mine. He is survived by his father, residing in Pasadena, three brothers, W. W., at Galice, George, of Portland, and Fred, of Los Angeles, and a sister Mrs. W. C. Ewing of Ada, Ohio.

F. W. Russell Sr. Dies at Pt. Angeles
The Josephine County bank received a telegram from the coroner at Port Angeles, Washington, at noon today, asking for information of Capt. F. W. Russell Sr., who it was stated had died there suddenly last night. Mr. Russell left here about February 26 for the north, having in his possession a certificate of deposit in the Josephine County bank, and it was through this that the coroner wires the bank asking for information. No particulars have been received other than that contained in the telegram, though F. W. Russell Jr. will leave tonight for Port Angeles to take charge of his father's body. The elder Russell, who was an old sea captain, had expected to take passage on a vessel going south to San Francisco for the trip, and it is believed that he was in Port Angeles for that purpose.
