GERMAN WARSHIPS IN THE NORTH SEA

London, Mar. 7.—Rumors that Prince Henry of Prussia in command of the German fleet for its expected dash into the North sea were received and given wide credence here today.

Amsterdam reported 15 German warships cruising in the North sea yesterday. They were said to have been observed off the coast of Holland, proceeding north in battle formation.

Russian destroyer squadrons were recently seen off the Swedish coast. It is predicted the British and Russian fleets may combine against the Germans should the latter seek battle.

Lord Derby and other members of parliament recently forecast a North sea battle, which they expect soon.

A Pirate's Made Kingdom.

Florida island is in latitude 25 degrees 5 minutes south and longitude 80 degrees 0 minutes west, or almost exactly south of Vancouver island and just a little south of the tropic of Capricorn. It was first settled in 1790 by nine mutineers from the English ship *Bounty* and eighteen natives of Tahiti. By the year 1806, when the island was discovered by the English, the population had grown to sixty-six persons, who formed a model community under the patriarchal government of John Adams, the only surviving mutineer, who had saved a Bible from the ship and was ruling with wisdom and justice his little kingdom of eighty-one or two miles in length. The island is under the British flag and has a couple of hundred inhabitants.—*Christian Herald.*

BURIES ITS OWN SEED.

How the Peanut Plant Protects its Fruit From Destruction.

Here's a plant mother that buries her children to protect them. While the children of other plants are being kidnaped by animals and birds, these youngsters are carefully hidden away beneath the ground so they can grow in safety. But man won't permit the mother to keep her children long. He digs them up and eats them. The plant is the peanut.

Its leaves look like a four leaved clover. Its blossoms are a dainty yellow, shaped like those of the sweet pea. When they wither and fall off the mother plant begins to worry about her seed children, for if the birds and animals kidnap them before they ripen they won't have a chance to grow and produce more plants next year.

So she bends her stalk downward, and each head where the flowers have fallen off she pokes into the ground. There the little seeds develop inside of wrinkly, paper-like pods. Sometimes the little tunneling moles and them and eat them, or maybe hogs will come and root them out. Usually, however, they're safe from all marauders.
