## MERLIN RESIDENT DIES SUDDENLY

J. S. Thompson, a resident of Merlin, dropped dead Saturday afternoon while walking to his home after a visit to this city. Mr. Thompson had come to Grants Pass with a neighbor, but was walking home along the Southern Pacific railroad track. When beyond the summit, he stopped to talk with the members of the section crew from Merlin, and while thus engaged fell dead in the center of the track without warning. The section crew put forth every possible effort to restore life in the stricken man, but without avail.

The deceased has lived in and near Merlin for a number of years, owning a farm north of the village, and was between 50 and 60 years of age. He has recently been employed by the Rogue River Orchard company. He was a respected citizen of the community, and leaves a wife and daughter to mourn his decease. The funeral services were held at Merlin at 11 o'clock today, being conducted by Rev. S. A. Douglas of the Baptist church of Grants Pass.
