RESTORATION TO ENTRIES OF LANDS IN NATIONAL FOREST

Friction and Velocity. When one solid body glides over the surface of another the coefficient of friction diminishes as the velocity increases and nearly vanishes when the velocity attains a certain critical value. This diminution of friction is due to the air which partially separates the two bodies at low relative velocities and separates them completely at the critical and all higher velocities.
