PROBE CONDITION SCHOOL BUILDING

The outcome of the meeting of taxpayers of the school district held Wednesday night was the appointment of a committee composed of Messrs. D. A. Fitzgerald, M. C. H. Day and A. J. Green to investigate the high school building and report its recommendations back to the patrons of the school. Architect E. E. McKibbin reported that after an examination of the building he estimated that it would cost about \$4,000 to reinforce the assembly room so that it would be safe and serviceable. To properly reinforce the entire building, using cement pillars and steel girders, the cost, he said, would be around \$10,000. This would contemplate the replacing of all the partitions within the building which are supporting weight with concrete, steel and brick. The action of the board will be based upon the report of the special committee.

Tonight the gates will shut upon him as he enters the penal institution to begin the closing chapter of his life, the balance of which is to be spent in the penitentiary—unless some tender-hearted executive turns him loose. Bousman was sentenced to life upon conviction for second degree murder, there now being no penalty provided by law for first degree murder.

BROCCOLI GROWN IN ROGUE VALLEY

The question, can broccoli be successfully grown in the Rogue valley? has been convincingly answered by E. J. Brown, who lives on the upper Applegate. Mr. Brown came to town Wednesday with a load of the succulent vegetable which he had grown on his ranch, and the heads of the plant were as solid and handsome as any shipped into the local market during the season. Mr. Brown planted only a quarter of an acre of the broccoli, and his receipts from this small tract will be over \$50, or at the rate of \$200 per acre. He has marketed some of the crop in Medford, the load Wednesday being the first brought to Grants Pass. The heads were solid and bleached out as white as snow, though Mr. Brown said that they seemed to be somewhat later in heading than he had expected, just recently having come to marketable condition. This may be because of the variety, though it is believed that Rogue valley broccoli may be several days later than that grown in the Umpqua valley, which has a lower altitude. A sample head of the home-grown broccoli can be seen in the Courier window.

ALASKA DOG TEAM RACE IS NOW HALF RUN

Nome, Alaska, April 13.—With a team of 17 Siberian wolf hounds, with which he won last year's All-Alaska sweepstakes, Leonard Soppala is today enjoying a nice lead over the other four entries in the famous dog race from Nome to Candle and return, a distance of 412 miles.

The leader arrived at Candle last night amid a flurry of light snow. Before his departure a blizzard was raging, but he was not to be detained and started on the return journey. The severity of the storm made the going very difficult during the last part of the trip.

Soppala's time for the 206 miles from Nome to Candle was 33 hours and 55 minutes.

GOVERNMENT AFTER PRIZEFIGHT FILMS

New York, April 13.—That the government is determined to prosecute the attempt to evade the law forbidding the importation of prizefight films by displaying pictures of the Johnson-Willard fight was made clear today when the United States district attorney declared he had prepared warrants for seven men. The government will contend that the rephotographing of the negatives taken in Havana by setting up a camera on the Canadian line was a mere subterfuge which violated the spirit of the federal law.

TEXAS MILITIA MAY SOON PATROL BORDER

Austin, Texas, April 13.—The militia hospital corps' equipment was taken from its store rooms here today and prepared for service. The adjutant general's department is most busy. Officers believe the Texas militia will soon be called out to patrol the border.

FRANCE GETS EVIDENCE OF SUSSEX SINKING

Paris, April 13.—The French government not only has 13 fragments of the torpedo which was launched at the channel steamer Sussex but it also has the names of all sailors on the attacking German submarine. It was officially claimed today.

The information concerning the identity of those aboard the submarine which attacked the Sussex was obtained from the crew of a U boat captured April 5.
