ANCHORAGE LABORERS REJECT NEW WAGE SCALE Seward, Alaska, April 29.—Striking laborers on the Anchorage division of the government railroad have rejected today the increase wage scale offered by the federal arbitration commission. A poll of the Seward union showed 98 per cent of its members in favor of acceptance of the scale. The advance gives common laborers 43 cents an hour, or \$3.50 per eight-hour day; longshoremen, \$4.50 per day and skilled laborers 70 cents an hour. All work is shut down.
