## Siskiyou Timber Sold—

The contract for cutting from the Siskiyou national forest in the Upper Land creek watershed approximately 27,000,000 feet of government timber was awarded by the district forester to the Coos Bay Timber company, of Oakland, Cal. The timber consists mainly of Douglas fir. The kinds of timber and the price per thousand feet were: Douglas fir, \$1.25, 18, 795,000 feet; Port Orford cedar, \$2, 6,705,000 feet; red cedar, \$1, 700,000 feet; hemlock, 50 cents, 1,070,000 feet. The company has until July 30, 1919, in which to remove all the timber.—Oregonian.

## Lands off Tax Roll—

The state tax commission has notified County Assessor Pollock that in view of the forfeiture of the O. & C. granted lands to the federal government, these lands are not now subject to taxation. Only those portions of the grant that were sold by the railroad company prior to July 1, 1913, or that are used by the company as right-of-way—a strip 100 feet in width each side of the tracks, and all lands in actual use by the railroad company on December 9, 1915, for depots, sidetracks, wood yards, and standing grounds, are subject to taxation. The bill recently passed by congress appropriates sufficient money to pay the taxes now ac-

## FLOOD DAMAGE AT WASCO

Portland, July 1.—Postmaster W. E. Tate of Wasco telegraphed the United Press today, estimating damage as a result of the cloudburst at \$25,000 and confirming the four deaths.

"A wall of water 20 feet high swept down Hay creek canyon at 5:30 p. m. yesterday," Tate's message said.

Bridges and roadway were washed away. One bridge was lifted from its concrete piers and carried intact for a mile. At least two farm houses were demolished and several head of livestock were drowned.

## New Tortoise Shell is Worked.

The soldering of two pieces of tortoise shell together is effected by means of hot pinches, which, while they compress, soften the opposed edge of each piece and amalgamate them into one. Even the raspings and powder produced by the file, mixed with small fragments, are put into molds and subjected to the action of boiling water and thus made into plates of the desired thickness or into various articles which appear to have been cut out of a solid block.
