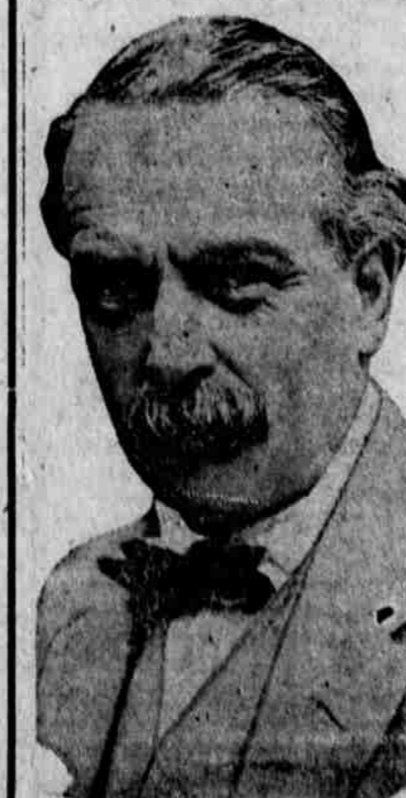
John Pernoll motored to Medford Wednesday.
