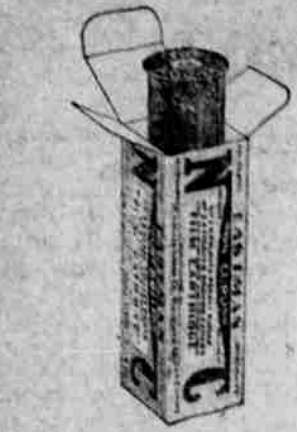

LINER BRITANNIC IS REPELLED SUNK

London, Aug. 3.—The liner Britannic, owned by W. H. Cockerline & Company, has been sunk, it was announced today. The Britannic was unarmed.

The liner Britannic, of the Cockerline company, was a steel screw vessel of 3,487 tons. She was built in 1904. Hull was her home port. As the British press bureau confines all announcements as to the loss of steamers to the mere announcement of their being "sunk," whether by mine or torpedo, it may be assumed that the Britannic was torpedoed, in view of the statement that she was unarmed.
