REPAIR THE HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

Forces of workmen have been busy at the high school for a number of weeks past making necessary repairs and renovating the entire building. They will be at work for a few days more, but when the school bell rings on Monday morning all of the buildings will be ready for occupancy. At the high school massive piers of concrete have been built from the basement foundation to the top of the auditorium ceiling to support the roof truss, and concrete partitions have replaced wood partitions from the basement to the first floor. The wooden props in the basement and on the first floor supporting the auditorium yet remain, awaiting a time when the district can afford to spend more funds on repairs. As it now stands the building is perfectly safe in every way. All of the rooms have been thoroughly scrubbed and the desks and chairs have been cleaned and are bright with new varnish. At the Central and Riverside schools also the cleaning has been extensive, including the floors, walls and desks.

SENATORS OFFER TO SPEAK FOR HUGHES

Chicago, Sept. 6.—Nine United States senators today wired western republican headquarters here offering their services to stump middle western and far western states in support of the candidacy of Presidential Nominee Hughes. The announcement was made by Fletcher Maddox, in charge of the speakers' bureau. The senators who offered their services were Cummins and Kenyon, of Iowa; Borah of Idaho; Weeks of Massachusetts; Wadsworth of New York; Harding of Ohio; Curtis of Kansas; Sterling of South Dakota, and Jones of Washington. Former Senator Burton of Ohio also tendered his services. Frank Hitchcock, of New York, is expected here within a few days for a conference with western republican leaders. It is planned to have Hitchcock visit Montana, Nevada, Colorado, Arizona, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oklahoma and North Dakota to study conditions and report.

LOS ANGELES TO PAY FOR ELECTRIC LINE

San Francisco, Sept. 6.—The state railroad commission today fixed at \$4,750,000 the just compensation to be paid by the city of Los Angeles to the Southern California Edison company for the company's electric distributing system in and adjacent to Los Angeles, which Los Angeles proposes to use to distribute the electric energy of the Owens river aqueduct. An additional \$1,578,000 for severance damages was also fixed. Commissioner Egerton, who held all the hearings in the case, dissented from the majority opinion and fixed the valuation at \$4,000,000, with severance damages of \$905,521. The Southern California Edison company claimed \$20,000,000.
